Private labels crowd the aisles in slow season

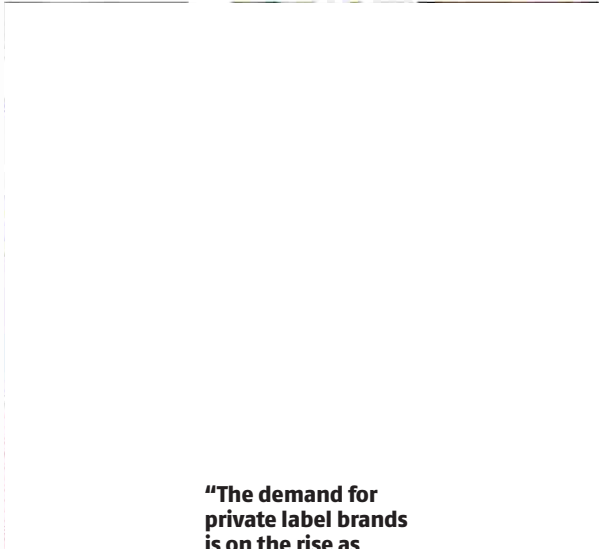
From detergents to electronic goods and fashion, retailers bet big on private labels as consumers look for affordable options within the branded universe

Scroll down the online shopping aisles or walk over to the local supermarket, everywhere the rows are overflowing with smartly packaged but little-known brands, all jostling for space with larger, storied names in their categories. Be it fresh milk or cosmetics, electronic goods or home care, private labels are all the rage today. Flipkart, Grofers, Amazon and Big Bazaar among others are pushing their own brands more aggressively, their enthusiasm fuelled by the higher margins that these labels earn and the buy-in from a widening consumer group.

Online grocery retailer Grofers said that in just over a year, it has expanded to over 800 private labels across categories, from staples and kitchen ingredients to personal care, cleaning products and others. Saurabh Kumar, founder of Grofers said, "In FY2019, private labels accounted for nearly 40 per cent of the total sales of ₹ 2,500 crore."

Euromonitor, in its country report earlier this year, said that in the offline space, the chained supermarkets and hypermarkets are actively pushing their private label products by allocating greater shelf space, offering discounts and products that are priced to cater to both ends of the consumer spectrum. Aditya Birla Retail, Future Consumer Enterprises and Trent Hypermarket are the leading private label players in the country according to the report that also noted that the presence of private labels is

more pronounced in laundry care, surface care and toilet care.

Private labels perform an important function in a downturn scenario, downturn trading does happen. Brand-consumption caves in and private-labels dominate. But this is mostly a short-term affair," he said.

However a sustained push from the retailers towards their private labels business is ensuring a long-term buy-in said many. For instance, Flipkart Private Brands has since 2017 built seven brands that cut across 200 categories and over 10,000 products. Adarsh Menon, vice president-Private Labels, Electronics, Furniture at Flipkart said, "What we realised in 2017 was that there were some gaps between what consumers were looking for and what the market had to offer. This was the reason we decided to foray into this space. Over the last year, the selection has been scaled (under private labels) by more

than 50 per cent."

Flipkart's private label brands include SmartBuy, Perfect Home, MarQ, Billion and Divastri and around two-thirds of its customers (for these labels) are from Tier II cities and beyond. Grofers said that it has seen a strong buy-in for private labels in smaller cities like Meerut, Rohtak. While the response has been good in all categories and across customer cohorts, staples, packaged food and cleaning supplies are the best performing categories for us, Kumar said. Grofers is planning to expand its private label portfolio from 800 products to over 1,200 by the end of 2020. Also by 2020, it is looking at increasing the share of own brands from 40 per cent to 60 per cent.

While small towns and semi-urban areas have been keen on such brands, affinity for private labels is geographically agnostic. This is encouraging many e-commerce and offline retailers to invest in the business. Bijoor said, "E-commerce players will continue to seek better margins in private labels of their own. There will however be tumult, as established brands get cannibalised by this private label play." For instance in the liquid detergents category, Future Consumer has just launched its own label, Whirlpool has its own too that retails online and is also directly marketed to those who have purchased its washing machines. These labels are going head to head with HUL and P&G. The battle for consumer mindspace is not only a heated one, but also one that is increasingly veering off the old rulebooks.

SAT quashes Sebi...

SEBI TO MOVE SC

Sebi might move the Supreme Court against the order passed by the SAT. Sources said the regulator is worried that its jurisdiction for acting against auditors could be challenged following the latest order. Sebi is of the view it has entirely justified for taking action against audit firms when it comes to auditing listed companies to protect minority shareholders' interest.

"The order raises an important jurisdictional point. At present, the National Financial Reporting Authority is not fully functional. Even assuming it was the jurisdictional issue will still crop up when it comes to action taken against auditors by Sebi or the RBI. Almost certainly, the SC will have the final word on this," said Sandeep Parekh, partner, Finsec Law Advisors.

Legal experts believe Sebi may have to come up with a better legal strategy when it comes to going after audit firms.

"Anyone adversely impacting the transparency of the securities market should be under Sebi's scanner. However, Sebi may be required to come up with a better legal strategy to go after entities such as the auditors, who are under the purview of Section 140 of the Companies Act and the Chartered Accountants Act. Sebi needs to identify in a much more granular way the exact violation and the punitive action," said Vidisha Krishan, partner, MV Kini & Co.

Tax dept in...

"There's been plenty of problems in electronic assessment and this would only increase with the new format. In some cases, taxpayers deliberately drag it till the end, while some of them upload illegible copies. Another key issue is revenue audit, which defeats the whole purpose of faceless assessment," said an official quoted above. Experts say while the faceless format may not face many hassles in the case of individuals, there could be litigations while dealing with corporate entities due to varied interpretations of tax laws.

The Income-tax Department is going through deliberations and testing for a smooth roll out of the faceless tax administration. The department has even raised the issue of CAG auditing to arrive at a middle ground. "A separate username and password could be created for this purpose where the auditors will get the details of all the assessments online," the official said.

Banks may...

DHFL retired most of its CPs since October last year; it has an outstanding of about ₹220 crore.

In a statement, DSP Mutual Fund (MF) said it received a payment of ₹150 crore from DHFL towards CPs. DHFL plans to pay about ₹70 crore to IDBI MF. With these payments, it will not have any outstanding CP on its balance sheet.

The remaining ₹580 crore is likely to be utilised to meet the interest obligation due to banks.

DHFL on Monday intimated stock exchanges that it has honoured payment obligations due till July 5.

"By furnishing interest for this period, DHFL will remain a standard asset for the banks. The banks to will also get more time to work on the resolution plan," said a source.

DHFL had last honoured its interest obligation to banks on June 4. Since June 25, lenders have been working on the resolution mechanism under the June 7 circular issued by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI).

June 7 circular allows 180 days for banks to implement the resolution plan and avoid provisioning under the said circular. However, RBI norms on income recognition and asset classification or IRAC requires a loan account in default for 90 days or more, to be classified as an NPA and be provided for accordingly.

At present, DHFL remains a standard asset for banks, though private entities such as Axis Bank and IDFC First have made voluntary provisioning towards their exposure to it.

Centre mulls ban...

He reiterated this on Monday while addressing delegates from nearly 200 countries at the high-level segment of the 14th conference of parties to the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) in Greater Noida.

"My government has announced that India will put an end to single-use plastic in the coming years. I believe the time has come for even the world to say goodbye to single-use plastic," said Modi.

The beverages industry, however, is planning to request the CPCB to exclude plastic bottles, irrespective of size, from the list. Plastic bottles, less than or equal to 200 ml, is often used in hotels, airlines, banquet halls, etc. "PET (polyethylene terephthalate) forward and backward chain economy in India is worth ₹7.5 trillion, employing around 7.2 million people. PET bottles of 200 ml or below contribute to almost 40 per cent of this economy, which is mainly used by pharmaceuticals, personal care, home care, insecticides, juices, liquor, packaged drinking water and dairy industry," said Pankaj Uppal, manager, public policy, PET Packaging Association for Clean Environment (PACE).

According to PACE, there is no alternative to such bottles in the market as these are "highly recyclable." In a presentation on September 5, CPCB Chairman S P S Parihar sought a formal response from the plastic industry by September 11 on the proposed list of products—whether it requires any modifications or alternatives, present consumption and production quantities, difficulties anticipated in banning these items, and cost economics, among others.

Rwanda, Ghana, Zambia want barter with India

In July, the ministry of external affairs informed Parliament that 279 LOCs, aggregating to nearly \$279 billion, have been extended to 63 countries since 2005-06. Of these, 191 LOCs to the tune of nearly \$11.58 billion have been extended to Africa.

An LoC constitutes loans to promote bilateral economic relations. Under it, a minimum 75 per cent of the contract value must be sourced from India in the form of goods and services, including consultancy services. A relaxation of 10 per cent is made on a case-to-case basis.

India has been providing LOCs on concessional terms to African nations to counter China's growing influence in the region. Indian policymakers have been cautious of Beijing's move to economically connect Africa with Asia and Europe through its ambitious Belt and Road initiative (BRI).

While China has committed to invest \$126 billion across the region under the BRI, India has tried to counter this through increased LoC disbursements.
