40-yr-old man brandishes sword at civic bus driver

The Vashi police booked a 40-year-old man for allegedly brandishing a sword after his car hit a civic transport (NMMT) bus on Monday night. The accused hit the sword at the driver's door, asking him to alight.

Sanny Lamba, is a resident of Neel Sankul in Kalamboli. According to the police, route number 31 of the NMMT bus was headed to Koparkhairane from Uran on Monday night. When it was crossing sector 10 in Vashi at

Accused was angry as his car rammed into bus when driver applied brakes to let pedestrians pass

around 10.15pm, the bus driver had to apply an emergency brake as a few pedestrians started crossing the road suddenly.

Due to the sudden halt, a four-wheeler coming from behind hit the bus and was damaged slightly. The angry car owner, Lamba, came out and started abusing the bus driver. In a fit of rage, he took out a sword and started hitting the bus and asked the driver to get down. Despite the bus driver trying to convince him, Lamba didn't listen. Later, the bus driver, Suryakant Balaji Suryavanshi, 20, attached to the Ghansoli depot of NMMT, registered a complaint with the police.

The Vashi police registered a complaint under the Indian Penal Code section 279 (any individual who is driving or riding a vehicle in a negligent manner, thereby endangering human life, will be punished by law) as well as the relevant provisions of the Arms Act and the Maharashtra Police Act.

Govt schools to soon turn a new leaf with adoption by corporates

State government mulling proposal; corporates to be given responsibility for five or 10 years as part of social outreach; schools may be named after benefactors; 62,000 schools in state

With a view to tap Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR) funds to improve school infrastructure, the Maharashtra government is mulling a proposal to have industries adopt state-run schools. There are around 62,000 government schools, catering to around 50 lakh students across the state.

Under this scheme, the corporates will be given the responsibility to improve the infrastructure and other amenities of various schools for a period of five or 10 years as part of their social outreach. These schools could be named after their respective benefactors.

The proposal, mooted by the School Education Department, was approved on Tuesday by finance minister Ajit Pawar and is now awaiting a green signal from the Chief Minister and the state cabinet.

Announcing the initiative at an event to award teachers on the occasion of National Teachers' Day, school education minister Deepak Ke-

sarkar said, “There are a large number of industries in the state that give their CSR funds to NGOs, which in turn

use them for various experimental projects at schools. However, many of the schools lack basic infrastructure

such as paint and audio-visual equipment. Hence, the schools should get CSR money to improve their facilities.”

Kesarkar added that the companies will be incentivised by letting them attach their name to the school's existing name.

Pawar, who also spoke at the event, said that the scheme will help the state retain part of CSR funds allocated by the industries based in Maharashtra.

Francis Joseph, a city-based educationist, wants the government to tread cautiously while seeking private funds for its education institutes. “For Public Private Partnership (PPP) to work, the government and the private entities need to be on the same page. There should be sufficient safeguards put in place to ensure that public resources are not exploited by the corporates. Also, the conditions for any pact between them should be fair,” he said.

The CSR funding can only be a temporary aid as it's affected by a number of factors including changing policies and the health of the business. The government institutes should be able to stand on their own feet, Joseph added.

Demanding hike, contract teachers stage hunger strike

Allege they got no raise in 7 years; 15 teachers have resorted to agitation; NMMC seeks time till September 15

Teachers from Anganwadi, primary and secondary schools as well as school helpers employed by the Navi Mumbai Municipal Corporation (NMMC) under fixed stipends have started a hunger strike in front of the civic headquarters from September 4. The objective of the strike is to demand a long-overdue increase in their stipends.

On September 4, a meeting was held between the teachers and the civic administration, where the latter requested time until September 15 to make a decision. However, the teachers insisted on receiving a written assurance regarding their demands. Fifteen teachers have resorted to hunger strike, with numerous colleagues offering their support. They alleged that there has been no increase in their fixed stipends since the last seven years.

The contract teachers had previously undertaken a hunger strike in July 2023 and received assurances from the civic administration that

their salary increment issue would be resolved within eight days. However, there has been no development so far. A teacher, Krishna Rathod, said that while the civic body assured a salary increase, they have not specified a deadline.

A senior civic official confirmed that a committee has been formed to work on increasing the salary of contract workers under fixed stipends. The committee's report is expected within a week and subsequent decisions will be made accordingly.

Currently, contract primary teachers receive Rs20,000, secondary teachers Rs15,000, and helpers get paid Rs12,000 per month. However, after essential deductions, they struggle to sustain their families.

Similarly, contract workers from the health and transport departments recently staged protests that resulted in salary rise. Now, education department contract workers argue that their counterparts in other departments receive better salaries.

Indo-Israel workshop gives security tips for digital world

Consultant advocates zero-trust policy for e-content, calls for caution against remote access softwares

A cyber security workshop was held recently in the city that shed light on the necessity of thorough online verification to protect against fraud. Cybercrime investigator and cybersecurity consultant Ritesh Bhatia emphasised the importance of pausing and 100% verification as essential safeguards.

The workshop, organised by the Federation INDO-IS-

RAEL Chambers of Commerce and Business workshop-cyber security, was held at the IMC Chamber of Commerce in Churchgate. Bhatia, who is also the founder of V4WEB Cybersecurity, served as the keynote speaker with the Consul General of Israel to Mid-West India, Kobbi Shoshani, as the chief guest.

Bhatia highlighted various online frauds and recommended security measures.

He urged everyone to adopt a "pause before you act" approach, refraining from immediate responses to online information. He advocated for a zero-trust policy when engaging with online content, emphasising the importance of fact-checking and seeking multiple and credible sources in this age of rampant misinformation.

Bhatia's address primarily focused on the alarming rise of deepfakes

and deep nudes and highlighted how widely-used tools like Teamviewer Quicksupport and Anydesk are used to deceive unsuspecting citizens. He further advised to utilise online tools like "Have I Been Pwned" and "Scattered Secrets" in case of compromised email addresses. Bhatia suggested cybercrime victims to immediately contact the helpline at 1930 and report the incident on

www.cybercrime.gov.in. Consul General Shoshani also addressed the gathering and made a striking observation that the wars of the future would not be fought with missiles but rather in cyberspace, with critical infrastructure as the battleground. He emphasised the urgency of Indo-Israel collaboration to prevent cyber attacks and ensure the security of both nations' digital ecosystems.
