Focus on Rohit and Kohli as India departs to Dubai for Champions Trophy

MUMBAI: Dressed natively in a white T-shirt and black tracks, Rohit Sharma got down from his car and walked towards his teammates at the departure lounge amid loud calls of 'Rohit bhai' and 'Rohit sir' by fans waiting near the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport entrance.

Most of the squad members arrived in the team bus including head coach Gautam Gambhir, vice-captain Shubman Gill and star batter Virat Kohli and the stars obliged some fans by signing autographs or waving at a few of them.

Soon, the team boarded an afternoon flight to Dubai for the upcoming Champions Trophy amid heightened optimism of netting another global trophy after winning the T20 World Cup last June.

A Jasprit Bumrah-less India will open their campaign against Bangladesh on February 20 in Dubai before the much-anticipated blockbuster against traditional rivals Pakistan February 23, and then the Men in Blue will take on New Zealand on March 2 to round off their league engagements.

The confidence – of the fans and the team – has been boosted by India's recent 3-0 ODI series whitewash at home

Those supporters assembled at the Mumbai airport will be hoping that the icons led by Rohit and Kohli will pull off another triumph like they did in the West Indies last year.

dium for an open bus parade.

If those scenes are to be repeated next month, then India will need some runs from Rohit and Kohli, who have topped heavy criticism after repeated failures in Test cricket.

But they replied in kind, as Rohit made a characteristically fluent hundred – a 90-ball 119 in Cuttack ODI against England – and Kohli his 73rd fifty in Ahmedabad.

This might have brought them a temporary relief but a productive outing in the Champions Trophy is mandatory in the context of the duo's

future in top-flight cricket.

With the emphasis firmly on hitting the next World Test Championship cycle from June and building a team for the 2027 50-over World Cup the Ajit Agarkar-chaired selection panel will closely observe how the two veterans fare in Dubai.

RETURN DAYS BEFORE FRENCH OPEN

Unforced error? Sinner let off with three-month ban

NEW DELHI: It seems the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) has done a very soft deal with Jannik Sinner, giving him just a three-month ban, effective from February 9 to May 4. In fact, the agreement between the two parties is so convenient, a majority of the tennis fraternity has lashed out at it as a farce or joke.

The sport of tennis was rocked by two big doping incidents in 2024, first of Sinner testing positive for clostebol and then Iga Swiatek being dealt with so kindly for a doping offence after she tested positive for trimetazidine, a banned substance. When Swiatek was let off lightly, everyone said the ITIA had been kind to her. Both Sinner and Swiatek competed at the Australian Open, with the former winning the title. Even as the world was speculating what would happen to Sinner as the WADA had dragged him to CAS (Court for Arbitration of Sports) and the hearing would

take place in April, the Sinner and WADA pact has become a joke. It is clear the WADA has been kind to Sinner. So many athletes have been hauled over the coals. After all, the WADA was unhappy with the verdict given by ITIA and wanted to press for a four-year ban.

Yes, Sinner is high-profile but to think he is needed at all the Grand Slams is bizarre. The way the whole thing has been scripted and played out, the backlash from the tennis fraternity is massive. From cranky Nick Kyrgios to grand old man Stan Wawrinka and Briton Tim Henman, they are all mocking

WADA. The general impression is the way the ban has been worked out, Sinner will be ready for the French Open. Imagine, a big player gets taken punishment and does not miss one Grand Slam. At the same time, there are so many lesser-known tennis players who have faced longer bans and their careers wiped out. To be sure, it is not Sinner who deserves all the criticism, but the WADA. What was the compulsion they soft-peddled on Sinner? Was it his giant stature or was it due to other compulsions is the buzz now. Whichever way one looks at it, people have lost faith in the anti-doping mechanism in place in tennis.

Gulveer breaks 3,000m indoor national record

NEW DELHI: Hangzhou Asian Games bronze medalist Gulveer Singh made a strong start to his season, shattering a 16-year-old national record in the men's 3,000m indoor race at the BU David Hemery Valentine Invitational in Boston.

The 26-year-old Army runner clocked 7 minutes, 38.26 seconds, finishing second in the event and surpassing the previous Indian record of 7:49.47 set by Surender Singh in 2008.

Buoyed by his impressive performance, Gulveer has now set his sights on securing automatic qualification for the 2025 World Athletics Championships in the men's 10,000m, where the entry mark is 27:00.00. "I'm elated to have clocked a good time in my season's first indoor race in Boston," stated Gulveer, who won bronze in the 10,000m at the Asian Games. "Good performance over 3000m (Indoor) has given a big boost to my confidence. I should be able to do better during upcoming outdoor races." AGENCIES

NRAI MEETING

Rana back in NRAI fold as 25m pistol coach

NEW DELHI: The legendary Jaspal Rana is back in Indian shooting's mainstream as the national federation on Saturday made him the high-performance coach for 25m pistol, while picking the decorated Jitu Rai for the 10m air pistol coaching job.

The National Rifle Association of India (NRAI), the sport's apex body in the country, appointed several former shooters as coaches of the national team during its governing body meeting at the Constitution Club here.

Also appointed as head coach (rifle) was the latest Dronacharya award recipient Deepali Deshpande.

In all, a total of 16 new members were appointed to the coaching team, with 19 being retained, including one coordinator (Amar Jung Singh) and two coaches (Priti Sharma and Anuja Jung) for deaf shooters.

Prominent names who have been appointed new national team coaches include pistol ace Jitu (10m air pistol) as well as former internationals Pooja Ghatkar (10m air rifle), Pema Tamang (25m pistol), Amarrinder Cheema (skeet) and Varsha Tomar (trap), among others. Two high-performance managers - Mansher Singh and Ronak Pandit - have also been appointed for the disciplines of shotgun and pistol. AGENCIES

WPL: DC leave it late against MI

VADODARA: Delhi Capitals produced a splendid bowling effort before their batters, led by Niki Prasad, survived some anxious moments to register a narrow two-wicket win over Mumbai Indians in a last-ball thriller in the Women's Premier League here on Saturday.

Opting to bowl, DC bundled out MI for 164 in 19.1 overs, with Nat Sciver-Brunt's commanding unbeaten 80 and Harmanpreet Kaur's quickfire 42 off 22 balls anchoring the innings. Chasing the target, Shafali Verma's blistering 43 off 18 balls gave DC a flying start, as they reached 60 for no loss. However, MI staged a sensational comeback, almost derailing the chase.

Alice Capsey (16), Annabel Sutherland (13), and Sarah Bryce (21) kept DC in the hunt before Niki Prasad (35) showed great temperament under pressure to steer them closer to the target. Needing 21 off the last 12 balls with four wickets in hand, No. 9 Radha Yadav (9 not out) smashed a six to reduce

However, she holed out in the fifth ball.

Given a fourth over, Shabnim Ismail cleaned up Meg Lanning, as DC suddenly slipped to 60 for 2. LONDON: Mikel Merino solved Arsenal's attacking problems with two late goals off the bench to secure a 2-0 win at relegation-threatened Leicester in the Premier League on Saturday.

With Arsenal's makeshift front three struggling to create chances, Merino – a central midfielder – came on in the 69th minute to play as a striker and quickly got on the end of two good crosses to decide the game. The Spain international headed home a pinpoint ball into the box from 17-year-old Ethan Nwaneri in the 81st and then steered in a low cross from Leandro Trossard in the 87th.

Merino said manager Mikel Arteta only told him when he was about to go on that his job was to play up front. "It was a bit of a surprise because it's the first time in my career I played that position," he said. AGENCIES
