Staff association seeks panel to assist students, St Stephen's principal says no need

A DEMAND by the Staff Association of St Stephen's College, to constitute a committee comprising the heads of all courses to "consider needs" for financial assistance to students, has been shot down by the Principal, who said it will "not be required" and that they could only recommend cases of "deserving students".

In his email response to the Staff Association president Nandita Narain, Principal John Varghese also said he was "disappointed" by the email and that it was "least required". He said "collective responsibility" was the need of the day, and that the pandemic was not the time for "pettifoggery" and "one-upmanship". Narain said she raised the issue again at a Finance Committee meeting Friday. By evening, the bursar put out a notice inviting applications from second and third year students "for a limited number of college bursaries". To apply, the applicants need to have a first division and family income below Rs 5 lakh per annum. They should also not have any other scholarship above Rs 20,000 per month. Narain had Thursday written to Varghese asking him to constitute the committee, and also consider the possibility of distributing laptops to those in need. The letter also referred to the suicide of a DU student "as a result of financial distress and lack of institutional support". Aishwarya Reddy (19), a second-year Lady Shri Ram College student, had

committed suicide on November 2 at her Telangana home. Her family couldn't afford a laptop for her to attend online classes. In his response, Varghese said, "Please be informed that the college and every working part of the college administration/community has ONLY the interest of the students at heart... I feel a little disappointed that a communication of the kind that you have sent was done. It is least required." "The college administration, including the Principal and the Bursar, are most accessible and, in fact, a recent communication by the Bursar also bears out the fact that some student issues pertaining to fees have been addressed. There has been no instance where a student has ever been turned away for want of funds; in fact the administration has only sought ways and means to ensure that our students face no problems, especially when it comes to academics," he added. Varghese said that the sugges-

tion for "Heads (of departments) being given the responsibility of forming a committee to handle bursaries... will not be required". "Heads may recommend the case/s of deserving students and the office of the Bursar will do whatever it takes to ensure that our students enjoy the benefits of an uninterrupted study to help them move on with their studies," he said. "This time of the pandemic is certainly not one to indulge in pettifoggery, one-upmanship or try to pull in different directions. The focus must be, will be on the students and they alone will be the centre of our focus," he added. On the possibility of distributing laptops, Bursar Renish Abraham had told The Indian Express Thursday, "We used to issue laptops to students while they were on campus, but now since laptops are provided by the university, I don't think we can send it to their residence... Probably we need to have a policy on this."

PARTIAL VICTORY, SAYS STUDENTS' UNION After student suicide, LSR announces fee cuts, hostel relaxation

MORE THAN a week after the Lady Shri Ram (LSR) College Students' Union submitted a 12-point memorandum to the principal in light of the suicide of Aishwarya Reddy (19), a second-year student of the college due to financial hardships, college authorities Friday announced they had accepted some demands, including reducing the fee for courses, setting up a committee to provide laptops to students, and allowing some second-year students to reside in hostels.

The Union called this a "partial victory" but said many demands were yet to be achieved. A document titled "response to the demands met by students", uploaded on the college website, read, "Given the fact that students are not able to avail certain facilities of the college due to being off-campus, the College has removed such charges from the fees this year. This has led to a substantial reduction in the fees... In addition, it is possible to pay the fee in installments." A revised fee notice states that the annual fee for all courses for second- and third-year students will now be Rs 7,970. LSR Students' Union general secretary Unnimaya said the fee ranged from Rs 12,000 to Rs

26,000 depending on the course. "While the fee has been revised, it is not transparent under which heads the charges have been waived off. The college authorities should clarify that," she said. LSR also decided that "keeping in mind the exceptional circumstances of the Covid pandemic, and for one year only", current second years "who lived in the hostel, upon fresh application" and "on the basis of need", will be allowed to stay in the hostel "after the Hostel's commitments to incoming first years and the current third years, who already are in the Hostel, have been met". "When the pandemic recedes and the situation normalises and hostel seats are once again 288 in number, the College would look into accommodating

Weekend cold wave as city sees frostiest Nov since 2006

A COLD wave is forecast in Delhi on Saturday and Sunday as the minimum temperature on Friday dropped to 7.5 degrees Celsius, lowest for the season so far this year and five degrees below normal.

For the month of November, this is the lowest reading of mercury at night time since 2006, as per India Meteorological Department (IMD).

Minimum temperature last fell below this mark at the IMD's Safdarjung observatory, which is representative of the city, on November 29, 2006 when it was 7.3 degrees Celsius.

Kuldeep Srivastava, head of the IMD's regional weather forecasting centre in Delhi, said, "We are receiving cold winds from northern areas that have witnessed snowfall in the past few days. Delhi is also seeing higher radiation and faster cooling at night time."

Srivastava added that areas in Himachal Pradesh, Uttarakhand and Jammu & Kashmir had witnessed snowfall earlier this week and winds from these regions were influencing Delhi's temperature.

He said that by Sunday, the minimum temperature is expected to reach 7 degrees Celsius. "Cold wave conditions could persist on Saturday and Sunday, after which the minimum temperature is expected to rise," Srivastava said.

In plains, the IMD's criteria

for cold wave is when the minimum temperature is 10 degrees Celsius or lower and the departure from normal temperature is below 4.5 degrees for two days.

Maximum or day time temperature in Delhi has also dropped from 31.6 degrees Celsius on November 4 to 25.4 degrees Celsius on Friday, two degrees below normal.

Meanwhile, the average air quality index (AQI) of Delhi deteriorated within the 'poor' category on Friday with a reading of 296, higher than 211 recorded on Wednesday, as per the Central Pollution Control Board.

Air quality is expected to remain in the 'very poor' to 'poor' category for the next two days, according to a forecast from the Ministry of Earth Sciences' monitor SAFAR

Woman forcibly sent to rehab, court orders probe

THE DELHI High Court has directed the CBI to conduct a preliminary inquiry into the affairs of a Dehradun-based drug rehabilitation centre where a 22-year-old Delhi woman was allegedly detained for at least 22 days on the request of her mother, who objected to her relationship with a married man from a different faith. Delhi Police has also been directed to register an FIR against the centre, its director and others responsible for her illegal detention.

The division bench of Justices Vipin Sanghi and Rajnish

Bhatnagar asked the CBI to examine "the complete records, activities and ongoings" at Golden Dream Society Rehabilitation Centre, Dehradun, and register a case, if it is made out, under provisions of law. The possibility of the centre being misused for the purpose of forcibly detaining people on the ground that they require rehabilitation cannot be ruled out, said the court. The order has been passed in a habeas corpus filed earlier this month by a friend of the detained woman. The court was told the 22-year-old was engaged in a property dispute with her mother and was missing since October 17. Delhi Police, in a status report, told the court on November 9 that she

was admitted to a rehabilitation centre as she was addicted to drugs—a claim challenged by her friend, who said it was her brother who was undergoing rehabilitation there once.

The story unfolded on November 12, when the 22-year-old was produced before the court through video-conferencing. Stating that she was not addicted to any substance, the woman told the court she was illegally detained. The rehabilitation centre's director, Vikas Bisht, conceded before the court she was not suffering from any addiction and does not require rehabilitation. It was also revealed that the centre charged Rs 8,000 from the woman's mother, who had

laid down conditions for her daughter's release.

After an interaction with the mother, the court came to the conclusion that "her real concern" is that her daughter is "in relation with... a married man with two children". She told the court he had been "exploiting" the 22-year-old for the past 2.5 years.

The court in the order said it has "counselled" the woman separately and she stated that she "does not wish to have any alliance" with either the man or her mother. The court directed police to ensure her release from the centre, noting that she is a major. Meanwhile, the HC also took note of Delhi Police's failure to act on complaints made by the

mother at police stations in Bindapur and Shahdara regarding threats issued to her and her son by the man who was allegedly in a relationship with her daughter. "Unfortunately, this is the usual trend. People who come from the poorer strata of the society hardly ever are heard by the police and their complaints remain unactioned," said the court, as it noted no FIR had been registered and no action had been taken. Directing the police commissioner to take action "against erring officials", the HC asked him to ensure that appropriate action is taken on the complaints filed by the mother and that the man does not come to her residence or loiter around the place.

Research points to PM1 increase, experts say most harmful

HIGH CONCENTRATION of ultra-fine particles in the air, which can "increase the risk of cancer", was found in Delhi-NCR in the days before and after Diwali by a NASA-funded research.

Analysis of data from 35 PurpleAir sensors in a radius of 200 km from Delhi found that the concentration of particulate matter of size one micrometre (PM1) increased from 100 µg/m3 in September to 200-300 µg/m3 in one month from October 15.

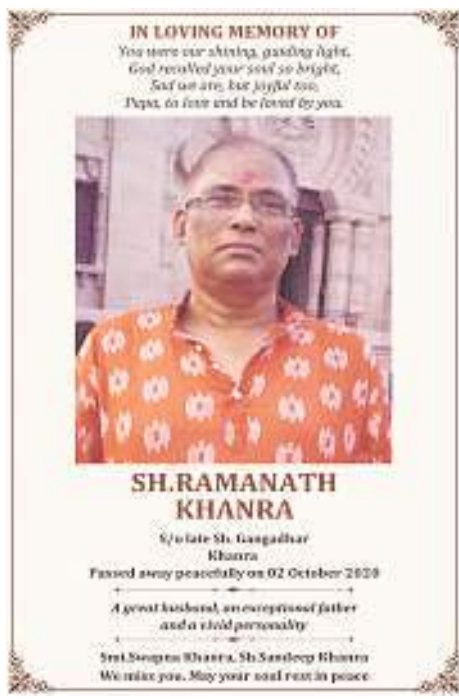
The data was analysed by Palak Balyan from the IIT Delhi, AP Dimri from JNU and SK Dhaka from DU, who emphasised on the need to monitor PM1, which presently does not have an exposure limit in India unlike PM2.5 and PM10. Balyan said, "PM1 can impact our health more by reach-

ing deeper into our lungs." Concentration of PM2.5, which has a 24-hour exposure limit of 60 µg/m3, was found to be close to 1,000 µg/m3 on November 10 and around 700 µg/m3 on November 14. While the analysis attributed this spike in PM2.5 to mainly crop residue burning in Punjab and Haryana, it also stated that high humidity and low temperature cause smaller PM1 particles to merge and form secondary particles of larger size. Professor Arun Sharma of the University College of Medical Sciences, DU, said, "Particles of size 1 micron or less are more harmful as they can cross the mucus barrier and, through blood circulation, reach any organ and cause damage or increase the risk of cancer." As per the analysis, composition of PM1 and smaller particles mainly "contain trace elements" that create a "carcinogenic risk".

Man alleges forced conversion by wife and her parents

New Delhi: A 28-year-old man has filed a complaint against his wife and her family for allegedly forcing him to convert to Islam. Police said the complainant, Mohit, has named his wife Nazreen, her parents Fareed and Shaheen, and uncle Ahmad. The FIR has been filed under sections of criminal intimidation, cheating by personation, extortion and outraging religious feelings. PK Mishra, DCP (Rohini), said the alleged incident dates back to last year.

Police said the woman and her family had also filed a dowry case against Mohit last year. As per the FIR, Mohit claims he met Nazreen on Facebook two years ago and she told him she is Hindu. "Five days before the wedding, I came to know she is Muslim. She told me that she's ready to be a Hindu... Later, she and her parents called me to Ghonda in UP and harassed me. They told me to give them Rs 80,000 and locked me in a hotel," he alleges, adding that they also coerced him to convert. ENS
