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Delhi, NCR, Chennai gear up for Covid-19 surges

First, some projections. By the end of this month, going only by the rise in new cases since June 5, when Unk-1.0 came into force, the number of coronavirus disease (Covid-19) cases in Mumbai would be 80,000; 100,000 in New Delhi and 71,000 in Chennai, which officials of all three metropolises agree, would greatly test their health infrastructure.

The unlock guidelines, crucial to restart economic activities and prepare the country to learn to live with Covid-19, has led to a spurt in cases in most states. Mumbai, Delhi and Chennai however, account for more than half of the total cases in the country today. These cities are among the 65 most critical Covid-19 affected districts in the country, according to the latest analysis of the health ministry shared with state governments.

Municipal Corporation (BMC), which is handling Covid-19 cases in the Mumbai, estimates that if the same pace of increase continues, the business capital of the country will have around 80,000 cases by the end June and over 100,000 by mid July.

Suresh Kakani, BMC's additional municipal commissioner, said that the numbers have stabilised in the past month. But that doesn't mean they're not large enough to cause concern. In the past month, Mumbai has seen a daily addition of anywhere between 1,000 to 1,700 cases. [June 16 fell short of the lower end of that range by 19 cases.] "The numbers have stabilised for now, but we cannot estimate saturation point. We will have to wait for one more week," he said. On Friday, Mumbai's case count was 71,000 with 1,600 new cases (3425 deaths (114 new deaths). The mortality rate in the city was 5.33%. The BMC officials said assuming that 1,500



7,000-8,000 tests daily," Kakani said.

The high number cases doesn't indicate that the city has reached its peak, experts said. Thus, the city must prepare for the eventuality that it hasn't.

Dr Siddharth Palwal, a city-based private health consultant said, "In the last

one month capacity of the medical health infrastructure has doubled, and the cases have risen from around 15,000 to 60,000. We will have to scale up at a much faster rate, if we are of the belief that the peak in Mumbai has yet not arrived." He added that the occupancy rate of the ICU beds and ventilators was above 90% on any given day.

Chennai, by comparison, has fewer cases than Mumbai, but it accounts for 70% of the total cases in Tamil Nadu. The state government, on June 15, announced a complete lockdown starting Friday and till the end of the month in Chennai and three adjoining districts, Chengalpattu, Thiruvallur and Kanchipuram. The lockdown was enforced after there was a steady rise in cases, an increase in deaths and lack of public willingness in maintaining social distancing and wearing masks.

After the first case was reported on March 24, by

July 7 - a day before Unk-1.0 was to start - Chennai had 21,419 out of the state's 31,657 cases. Ten days later, Chennai breeched the 35,000-mark while Tamil Nadu crossed the 50,000-mark. This month, the state has reported more than 1,000 new cases everyday with Chennai accounting for most of them. In the first week of May state-run Tamil Nadu Dr MGR Medical University projected that Chennai would have roughly 71,000 cases by June-end and 150,000 cases by the second week of July. However, this forecast may change with the imposition of the 12-day lockdown.

"Rather than focusing all resources on 1 million people in the containment zones, the city now has to control its entire population of 8 million," said a member of the task force constituted to recommend ways to contain the spread of Covid-19, who was not willing to be named.

To deal with the increase in cases, Chennai has prepared a micro-level plan for each of 200 wards in the city with an assistant commissioner in charge at each ward. The Chennai municipal corporation is conducting door-to-door surveys for its 8.4 million population and has set up more than 400 fever camps and 10 mobile sample collection centres.

"We need a maximum of 30,000-35,000 beds to manage our peak," city corporation commissioner G Prakash had announced on June 7. He added that 30,000 additional staff nurses and 2,000 paramedics were appointed in June for Chennai and its three neighbouring districts.

"There is no clear data of daily testing figures in Chennai, but it is roughly pegged at 5,000. According to the health bulletin released on June 19, 160,000 samples have been tested in the city of Tamil Nadu, which was testing around 18,000 samples a day has ramped up testing to 25,000 daily in the past three days alone.

Delhi violence: HC denies Ishrat Jahan extension of interim bail

A Delhi court on Friday refused further extension of interim bail to former Congress councillor Ishrat Jahan, booked under the stringent Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act for her alleged role in the February riots in north-east Delhi.

She had sought extension on the ground that her husband and she had symptoms of Covid-19. She was earlier granted week's interim bail till June 19 for her wedding.

Additional sessions judge Dhamender Rana directed Jahan to surrender in jail on Friday and asked the jail superintendent to ensure adequate medical care. Jahan, through advocate Lalit Valecha, had earlier sought extension for seven

days interim bail granted till June 19 for her to get married.

"Considering the totality of circumstances, especially the opinion of the doctor and the nature of offence, no ground for extension of interim bail is made out in favour of the accused (Jahan)," the judge said.

Valecha said that Jahan married on June 12 and subsequently her husband came in contact with a relative who tested positive. Following this, the doctor advised the husband to test for the virus.

The plea also said that Jahan has also developed the symptoms and doctors advised seven days home isolation before undergoing a test herself. On Friday, Jahan's counsel told the court that her husband's report has been found negative.



The Delhi Polices, opposing the plea, filed a report and stated that the concerned Covid-19 test and that it was a case of fit.

"I have no specific reasons to doubt the report of the IO or the advice of the concerned medical expert. It is a settled principle of law that interim bail can only be granted in

exceptional circumstances. Mere apprehensions cannot constitute a valid ground for extension of interim bail," the judge said.

Jahan, is one of the accused in the UAPA case registered by the Special Cell of the city police to probe the riots that had in which over 50 people had died and more than 400 injured. While the

local police and crime branch are investigating at least 750 cases related to the riots, the special cellant terror unit) of the force had registered a separate case in FIR to probe the alleged larger conspiracy behind the riots in north east Delhi.

Besides Jahan, student activists Asif Iqbal Tunha, Gulfiisha Khatoun, Sateera Zargar, Meeran Haider, Shifun-Ur-Rehman, suspended AAP Councillor Tahir Hussain, activist Khalid Saifi, JNU scholars Naitaha Narwal and Devangana Kalita and former JNU student Umar Khalid have also been booked under the anti-terror law in the case.

Police have alleged that the riots was a conspiracy by people such as Hussain, Umar Khalid (not arrested) and Khalid Saifi, among others, who mobilised people

under the garb of holding anti-citizenship Amendment Act protests across the city. All the accused persons and their lawyers have denied the police's allegations and said that police have launched a writant against anti-CAA protesters.

Meanwhile, the Delhi High Court on Friday asked the city police to consider a representation by Pajra Tod member Devangana Kalita, arrested for her alleged involvement in the north-east Delhi riots, who approached court seeking video conferencing facilities with her lawyers because the legal meetings with private lawyers or meetings with family members in the prison have been suspended due to Covid-19. Only counsels of the Delhi State Legal Services Authority.

DU student to be first wheelchair-bound Indian to study at Oxford

"I met with a severe car accident on my way from Hoshiarpur to Chandigarh (Punjab), with my family. I was 13 then. With various other injuries, my spinal cord broke and made me paraplegic from chest down," recalls Prathiba Deveswar, a final year student of Lady Shri Ram College, Delhi University, in a matter-of-fact tone. Remembering the incident that changed her life is of course not easy for her, yet her tales gleam with positivity as she says in the same breath: "People with disabilities can achieve anything!" On the path to make her belief and statement true,



Deveswar had been a high ranker in academics, and convinced her family that she could study all by herself in Delhi, after being home schooled. "I always knew that I could overcome my situation only with education. So, after 12th, I told my parents that I don't want to live inside the four walls of my home anymore. I deserve better. I applied to LSRR, and got admission! That changed my life," says Deveswar who is now a wheelchair user in Delhi, roads, with shopping bags hanging on either sides. "Everyone advised my family to not to send me to Delhi because I'm differently-abled, and was dependent on them. So (they thought) it would be impossible for me to live alone. But, the world impossible was never in my dictionary! I started living by myself, getting up, packing, paid bills and even travelled, by myself, almost the whole of the city in the metro train. And don't be surprised if you see me buzzing around the roads of Delhi again, on my wheelchair, after the pandemic ends."

'People won't get tested out of fear' AAP MLA Raghav Chadha on 5 day institutional Covid-19 quarantine order

Aam Aadmi Party MLA Raghav Chadha on Saturday reacted to the five-day institutional quarantine order issued by Delhi Lieutenant-General Anil Bajjal and said that many people will not get tested fearing being whisked away to quarantine centres. He also said that the move will require 90,000 additional beds which will be a problem for the administration.

As per our calculation, Delhi needs 15,000 beds by June 30 but after this order, now we need 90,000 beds by June 30. The L-G's order added the five-day institutional quarantine, asymptomatic Covid-19 patients will be sent for home quarantine. Five days institutional quarantine of each case under home-quarantine is to be made mandatory and, thereafter, (they) will be sent for home-isolation, except in cases where symptoms require further hospitalization," Bajjal said in his order.

Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's order said that he has described the move as "arbitrary" and said it will "seriously harm" the national capital. The Kejriwal government has also asked the L-G to reconsider his decision. The national capital is struggling with a rapid surge in Covid-19 cases.

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Delhi violence: Tahir Hussain named in two fresh charge sheets

Delhi police on Friday filed two more charge sheets in cases related to the February riots in northeast Delhi. In both, the police charged suspended AAP councillor Tahir Hussain along with other accused.

The two charge sheets were filed in two separate incidents of violence during the riots - the first, related to arson and rioting at a parking lot in Chand Bagh, in which at least a hundred vehicles were set on fire, and the second, arson and robbery at a godown of essential goods in Karawal Nagar.

According to a senior police officer who asked not to be named, in the two charge sheets, police have charged Hussain, his younger brother, Shah Alam and at least 10 others for rioting, being armed with deadly weapons, decency, mischief by fire or explosive substance, unlawful assembly



and criminal conspiracy. "Both incidents took place on February 24 and two separate FIRs were registered on February 27. In the first case it had been established in the charge sheet based on electronic evidences and on the statements of the eye witnesses that Tahir Hussain led a mob into a godown of essential commodities in Karawal Nagar and set it afire. The owner of the godown claimed a loss of worth Rs 25-30 lakhs. Tahir Hussain and five others were

later arrested for the offence," the officer added.

In the second incident, the charge sheet mentions that Hussain and his younger brother Shah Alam along with eight others, reached Pradeep Parking Lot and broke open its shutters. They reached the first floor and robbed the people who were present there of their money and valuables. There were food preparations going on in the house in Chand Bagh. Hussain and others destroyed the food prepared and then

three petrol bombs into the parking area where several vehicles were parked at the time. All the vehicles parked in Pradeep Parking lot were gutted," the officer said.

At least 53 people died and 400 were injured in the rioting that started as clashes between supporters and opponents of the Citizenship (Amendment) Act or CAA. So far Delhi police have filed over 88 charge sheets in different cases related to the northeast Delhi riots, including three against Hussain (one of which accuses him of planning the murder of IB staffer Ankit Sharma).

Hussain had earlier denied the charges and said that police were framing him. Before being arrested, he told reporters that he was a victim of the northeast riots himself and was rescued from his house in Chand Bagh. Police have however denied this and claim he was part of the conspiracy.

At least five days' institutional quarantine for all Covid-19 cases in Delhi

The Delhi Disaster Management Authority (DDMA), headed by lieutenant governor Anil Bajjal, on Friday evening controversially ordered a mandatory five-day institutional quarantine for "each case" under home quarantine in the city, in an unexpected move that could strain the Capital's already stretched health care infra and workers, discourage people from undergoing tests, and inconvenience around 8,500 people currently under home isolation.

The move was immediately criticised as "arbitrary" by the state government, which, in a statement, pointed out its success in running a home quarantine programme and the challenges that will come with adding "thousands of quarantine rooms and finding additional doctors and nurses and health workers" to manage these

facilities. The statement also questioned why this change in guidelines was being made only for Delhi. "We have treated thousands of mild and asymptomatic cases at home so far through daily monitoring and counselling," it added.

According to experts, home quarantine is preferred, if the home meets certain conditions. Most countries in the world recommend it for mild cases. Experts also point to the risks of infections from crowded quarantine facilities.

"I am a big believer of home isolation as at least 90% of the cases, according to me are mild enough to not require hospitalisation. As long as precautions are taken and there is regular medical consultation, it is a good idea. Why unnecessarily burden the health infrastructure that anyway gets overwhelmed when there is surge in cases? Medical beds should be kept for serious patients needing specialised care, otherwise where will you keep your



serious patients whose lives we have to save? Home can be the best isolation facility so long as all protocols are followed," said T Jacob John, the former head of virology at CMC, Vellore.

DDMA said in its order that it fears "home isolation without physical contact to monitor the patients may be a reason for the increase in the spread of Covid-19 infections in Delhi". Total infections breached the 50,000 mark

on Friday, up from 20,000 on June 2.

According to the government's June 18 bulletin, 5,400 of its 10,900 Covid-19 beds were vacant, and roughly 5,000 beds were available out of 6,300 in Covid care and health centres. "This availability of resources is mainly because of the success of our home quarantine scheme for patients who are not badly infected and have space to

be safely isolated at home," a senior state government official said.

"Entire manpower of the Delhi government is already stretched. Now, large quarantine centres would need to be made to house thousands of asymptomatic people. Thousands of patients are being treated at home at the moment. After this order, we would immediately need thousands of beds in quarantine centres," the
