As you are aware, in view of the situation arising due to COVID-19 global pandemic, the general meetings of the companies shall be conducted as per the guidelines issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs (MCA) vide General Circular No. 02/2021 dated 13th January, 2021, read with General Circular No. 20/2021 dated 5th May, 2020, read with General Circular No. 14/2020 dated 8th April, 2020 and General Circular No. 17/2020 dated 13th April, 2020(collectively referred to as "MCA Circulars") and Circular number SEBI/HO/CFD/ CMD2/CIR/P/2021/11 dated 15th January, 2021 read with Circular No. SEBI/HO/CFD/CMD1/CIR/P/2020/79 dated 12th May, 2020 issued by the Securities and Exchange Board of India ("SEBI") (hereinafter referred to as "SEBI Circulars") wherein the Companies are permitted to hold the Annual General Meeting ("AGM")through video conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM) without the physical presence of the Members at a common venue. Accordingly, in compliance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 ("the Act"), SEBI (Listing Obligations and Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 ("Listing Regulations") and MCA Circulars, the 29th AGM of the Company is being held through VC/OAVM. Hence, Members can participate in the ensuing AGM/ through VC/OAVM only.

E-VOTING INSTRUCTIONS FOR ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING THROUGH VC/OAVM

- 1. In view of the massive outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, social distancing is a norm to be followed and pursuant to the Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, Circular No.17/2020 dated April 13, 2020 issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs followed by Circular No. 20/2020 dated May 05, 2020 and Circular No. 02/2021 dated January 13, 2021 and all other relevant circulars issued from time to time, physical attendance of the Members to the AGM venue is not required and general meeting be held through video conferencing (VC) or other audio visual means (OAVM). Hence, Members can attend and participate in the ensuing AGM through VC/OAVM.
- 2. Pursuant to the Circular No. 14/2020 dated April 08, 2020, issued by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, the facility to appoint proxy to attend and cast vote for the members is not available for this AGM. However, the Body Corporates are entitled to appoint authorised representatives to attend the AGM through VC/OAVM and participate there at and cast their votes through e-voting.
- 3. The Members can join the AGM in the VC/OAVM mode 15 minutes before and after the scheduled time of the commencement of the Meeting by following the procedure mentioned in the Notice. The facility of participation at the AGM through VC/OAVM will be made available for 1000 members on first come first served basis. This will not include large Shareholders (Shareholders holding 2% or more shareholding), Promoters, Institutional Investors, Directors, Key Managerial Personnel, the Chairpersons of the Audit Committee, Nomination and Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders Relationship Committee, Auditors etc. who are allowed to attend the AGM without restriction on account of first come first served basis.

The voting right of shareholders shall be in proportion to their share in the paid-up equity share capital of the Company as on the cut-off date, being Thursday, November 25, 2021.

How do I vote electronically using NSDL e-Voting system?

The way to vote electronically on NSDL e-Voting system consists of "Two Steps" which are mentioned below:

Step 1: Access to NSDL e-Voting system

A) Login method for e-Voting and joining virtual meeting for Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode

B) Login Method for e-Voting and joining virtual meeting for shareholders other than Individual shareholders holding securities in demat mode and shareholders holding securities in physical mode.

How to Log-in to NSDL e-Voting website?

- 1. Visit the e-Voting website of NSDL. Open web browser by typing the following URL: https://www.evoting.nsdl.com/ either on a Personal Computer or on a mobile.
- 2. Once the home page of e-Voting system is launched, click on the icon "Login" which is available under 'Shareholder/Member' section.

2. COMPANY'S PERFORMANCE AND REVIEW

The total revenue (net) of the Company for the year ended 31st March 2021, decreased by 85.50% and stood at ₹ 106.64 Lakhs as against ₹ 735.68 in the previous year. During the year the Company has incurred losses of ₹ 17.61 lakhs as against loss of ₹ 204.26 lakhs in the previous year. The performance during the year was not satisfactory due to various reasons beyond the control of the Management. The COVID-19's impact on our lives and economy has been earth shattering. The lockdowns and restrictions have sent the global supply chain in disarray and have halted industrial growth and have brought to the fore the importance of building domestic manufacturing facilities.

3. STATE OF THE COMPANY'S AFFAIR AND BUSINESS REVIEW

The details of the Company's affairs including its operations are more specifically given in the Management Discussion and Analysis Report, which is given in this Annual Report.

4. COVID 19:

In lieu of the second wave of Covid-19, the Company has taken various measures to ensure the safety and well being of all employees and was ensuring compliance with the directives issued by the Central Government, State Governments and local administration from time to time in this regard.

5. SHARE CAPITAL:

There was no change in the Share Capital during the Financial year 2020-21. The paid -up Share capital of your Company as on March 31, 2021 is Rs. 12,17,20,000/- (Twelve Crore Seventeen Lakh twenty thousand) divided into 30430000 Equity Shares of face Value of Rs. 4/- (Rupees four only) each.

6. LISTING OF SHARES:

The Equity shares of the Company are listed on National Stock Exchange of India Limited (NSE) and BSE Limited (BSE). The Company has paid the requisite listing fees to the respective Stock Exchanges for the financial year 2020-21.

7. DIVIDEND AND RESERVE:

In view of accumulated losses, your Directors do not recommend any dividend for the Financial Year 2020-2021. The details of the reserves and surplus are provided in Schedule No. 12 of the notes to the Audited Financial Statements.

8. TRASNFER TO RESERVE:

During the year under review, no amount was transferred to reserves.

9. CHANGE IN THE NATURE OF BUSINESS:

During the year under review there has been no change in the nature of business.

10. PUBLIC DEPOSITS:

During the year under review, the Company has not accepted any deposits within the meaning of Sections 73 and 76 of the Companies Act, 2013 ('the Act') read with Companies (Acceptance of Deposits) Rules, 2014.

11. HOLDING, SUBSIDIARIES, JOINT VENTURES AND ASSOCIATE COMPANIES:

As on March 31, 2021 the Company does not have any Subsidiary, Associate or Joint Venture Company. Hence, preparation of Consolidated financial statements and statement containing salient features of the Subsidiary/ Associate or Joint Ventures companies in Form AOC-2 as per the provisions of Section 129 of the Companies Act, 2013 is not applicable to the Company.

12. DIRECTORS AND KEY MANAGERIAL PERSONNEL:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 152 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with the Companies (Management and Administration) Rules, 2014 and the Articles of Association of the Company, Mrs. Minal Jangla, Director of the Company, is entitled to retire by rotation at the ensuing Annual General Meeting (AGM) and being eligible has offered herself for re-appointment.

Mr. Kiran Jangla, Managing Director of the Company demised on May 05, 2021.

Ms. Priti Panchal, Chief financial officer of the Company resigned w.e.f., October 18, 2020 due to her preoccupancy. Company has intimated her resignation to the Stock Exchange. During the year under review, Company has appointed Mr. Anoop Kabra as Chief Financial officer of the Company w.e.f., December 16, 2020

Your Board has appointed Mr. Kersi Pavri as the Non-Executive Director of the Company w.e.f., August 31, 2020 and Ms. Archana P. Dakhale w.e.f., September 27, 2021 as the Non-Executive Additional Director of the Company, subject to the approval of members.

Pursuant to Regulation 36(3) of the SEBI (Listing Obligations & Disclosure Requirements) Regulations, 2015 (hereinafter referred to as 'Listing Regulations') and Secretarial Standards on General Meeting (SS-2) issued by the Institute of Company Secretaries of India (ICSI), brief resume of the Director proposed to be re-appointed in the ensuing Annual General Meeting is annexed in Notice of 29th Annual General Meeting of the Company.

Your Board recommends the appointment of the Mrs. Minal Jangla as Director of the company.

All the Independent Directors of your company have given declarations that they meet the criteria of Independence laid down under Section 149(6) of the Act and the Listing Regulations.

During the year under review, the non-executive directors of the Company had no pecuniary relationship or transactions with the Company, other than sitting fees, commission, if any and reimbursement of expenses incurred by them for the purpose of attending meetings of the Board / Committee of the Company.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 203 of the Act, the Key Managerial Personnel of the Company as on March 31, 2021 are: Mr. Kiran Jangla-Managing Director, Mrs. Minal Jangla – Director and Chief Executive Officer, Mr. Kersi Pavri – Chief Financial Officer and Ms. Parul Gupta Company Secretary and Compliance Officer. The Company has complied with the requirements of having Key Managerial Personnel as per the provisions of Section 203 of the Act.

13. ANNUAL EVALUATION OF PERFORMANCE BY THE BOARD:

As per the provisions of Section 134 and Schedule IV of the Companies Act, 2013 the Board of Directors need to evaluate its own performance, the performance of all the individual Directors of the Company and the performance of committees of the Board.

The Board has carried out evaluation of its own performance, the directors individually as well as the working of its Audit Committee, Nomination & Remuneration Committee and Stakeholders' Relationship Committee of the Company. The Board has devised questionnaire to evaluate the performances of each of Executive, Non-Executive and Independent Directors. Such questions are prepared considering the business of the Company and the expectations that the Board have from each of the Directors. The evaluation framework for assessing the performance of Directors comprises of the following key areas:

- i. Attendance of Board Meetings and Board Committee Meetings;
- ii. Quality of contribution to Board deliberations;
- iii. Strategic perspectives or inputs regarding future growth of Company and its performance;
- iv. Providing perspectives and feedback going beyond information provided by the management.
- v. Ability to contribute to and monitor our corporate governance practices

The Independent Directors at their meeting held on 11th March, 2021, evaluated performance of the Chairperson, non-independent directors of the Company and the performance of the Board as a whole.

The Directors expressed their satisfaction to the outcome of the aforesaid evaluations and consented for continuation of present term of appointment of each of the Independent Directors.

14. DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITY STATEMENT:

Your Directors, to the best of their knowledge and belief and according to the information and explanations obtained by them and as required under Section 134(3)(c) of the Companies Act, 2013 hereby state that:

The Board has constituted its Committees in accordance with the provisions of the Companies Act, 2013 and as per the Listing Regulations. There are currently four Committees of the Board, which are stated as follows:

- a. Audit Committee;
- b. Stakeholders' Relationship Committee;
- c. Nomination and Remuneration Committee;
- d. Risk Management Committee.

Details of all the Committees along with their charters, composition and meetings held during the year 2020-21, are provided in the "Report on Corporate Governance" which forms part of this Annual Report.

17. AUDIT COMMITTEE AND ITS COMPOSITION:

The Audit Committee is duly constituted as per the provisions of Section 177 of the Companies Act, 2013 and Regulation 18 of the Listing Regulations. The Audit Committee of the Company reviews the reports to be submitted with the Board of Directors with respect to auditing and accounting matters. It also supervises the Company's internal control and financial reporting process.

All the recommendations made by the Audit Committee were accepted and approved by the Board.

The Composition of the Audit Committee is also given in the "Report on Corporate Governance" which forms part of this Annual Report.

18. STATUTORY AUDITORS:

In terms of Section 139 of the Act, Members of the Company at the 26th AGM held on September 27, 2018 had appointed M/s. Vijay V. Dedhia & Co, Chartered Accountants (Firm Registration No. 111439W) as the Statutory Auditors for a term of 5 years commencing from the conclusion of 26th AGM till the conclusion of the 31st AGM to be held in year 2023.

However, pursuant to the amendments made to Section 139 of the Act, by the Companies (Amendment) Act, 2017, effective from May 7, 2018, the requirement of seeking ratification of the members for appointment of Statutory Auditors has been withdrawn. In view of the same, the ratification of members for continuance of M/s Vijay V. Dedhia & Co, Chartered Accountants, as the Statutory Auditors of the Company, is not being sought. The Statutory Auditors have given a confirmation to the effect that they are eligible to continue with

their appointment and that they have not been disqualified in any manner from continuing as the Statutory Auditors. The Auditor's Report does not contain any qualification, reservation or adverse remark or disclaimer by M/s. Vijay V. Dedhia & Co, Chartered Accountants.

19. SECRETARIAL AUDITORS:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 204 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Appointment and Remuneration Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014, the company has appointed M/s. Shivlal Maurya & Co., Company Secretaries, Mumbai as Secretarial Auditor of the Company for the Financial Year ended March 31, 2021.

The Report of the Secretarial Auditor for F.Y. 2020-21 is appended to this Report as (**Annexure I**) which forms part of this Annual Report.

With regard to observations made by the Secretarial Auditors' in their Report, your Directors would like to state as under:

a. During the period under review Company has filed various eform with the Registrar of Companies with delay.

Due to covid and lockdown situation in country, there was delay in getting signed documents. Hence, Company delayed in filing few forms.

b. The Company has filed Corporate Governance Report Pursuant to Regulation 27(2)(a) of LODR for the for the quarter ended on 30th June, 2020 with delay of 2 days;

The delay in compliance regards to the para above was due to the technical issue at the time of uploading XBRL form. Company was not able to get OTP while uploading.

c. The Company has filed Reconciliation of Share Capital Audit Report Pursuant to Regulation 76 of the SEBI (Depositories and Participants) Regulations, 2018 for the for the quarter ended on 30th June, 2020 with delay of 4 days;

Reconciliation of Share Capital Audit Report was provided by Practicing Company Secretary Mr. Shivlal Maurya with a delay of 4 days. Hence, there is delay in uploading Share RECO report.

d. The Company has appointed National Securities Depository Limited as Designated Depository pursuant to SEBI Circular no. IMD/FPIC/CIR/2018/61 dated 5th April 2018 regarding monitoring of foreign investment limits in listed Companies, However it is in process of creating data with the Central Depository Services (India) Limited;

Company has appointed NSDL for Monitoring of Foreign Investment Limits and is in process of appointment of CDSL.

e. The Company does not have system in place pursuant to the provision of Securities and Exchange Board of India (Prohibition of Insider Trading) Regulations, 2015 regarding maintenance of the data of the Insiders;

The Company is process of appointing agency for maintain the data related to insiders.

20. INTERNAL AUDIT:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 138 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014, M/s. Thaker Butala Desai, Chartered Accountants, Mumbai, were appointed as Internal Auditors of the company for the Financial Year 2020-21.

Based on the report of internal audit, the management takes corrective action in respective areas observed and thereby strengthen the controls.

21. INTERNAL FINANCIAL CONTROL:

Your Company has an adequate Internal Control System commensurate with the size, scale and complexity of its operations and well-documented procedures for various processes which are periodically reviewed for changes warranted due to business needs.

The Audit Committee evaluates the efficiency and adequacy of financial control system prevailing in the Company, its compliance with operating systems, accounting procedures and policies at all locations of the Company and strives to maintain the Standards in Internal Financial Controls. This system of internal control facilitates effective compliance of Section 138 of the Act and the Listing Regulations.

During the year under review, no reportable material weakness in the operation was observed. Regular audit and review processes ensure that such systems are reinforced on an ongoing basis.

22. VIGIL MECHANISM/WHISTLE BLOWER POLICY:

The Vigil Mechanism/Whistle Blower Policy has been put in place in accordance with Section 177 of the Companies Act, 2013 for the Directors and Employees to report their genuine concerns about unethical behaviour, actual or suspected fraud or violation of the Company's Code of Conduct. The mechanism provides for adequate safeguards against the victimization of Director(s) and Employee(s) who avail of the mechanism. Directors and Employees may make protected disclosure under the policy to the Compliance Committee constituted by the Company to administer the internal code of business conduct. In exceptional cases, Directors and Employees have direct access to the Chairman of the Audit Committee. Further no personnel have been denied access to the Compliance Committee/ Chairman of the Audit Committee, as the case may be. The details of the Vigil Mechanism/ Whistle Blower Policy is explained in the Report on Corporate Governance and is also made available on the website of the Company at www.gfsteel.co.in

No complaints were received under whistle blower mechanism during the year under review.

23. REMUNERATION POLICY:

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

a) OVERVIEW: GLOBAL ECONOMY

One of the most unique years in recent times, CY* 2020 stood witness to the outbreak of the COVID-19 pandemic, which disrupted and shifted socio-economic dynamics globally. The year saw the pandemic spread across different geographies with different intensity, leading governments, businesses, organisations and individuals to respond in their own unique ways to adapt to the new normal. It was truly a year of two distinct halves, with the first two quarters mired in uncertainty and the last two quarters witnessing some green shoots of economic recovery following the large-scale fiscal stimuli, monetary policy impetus, and massive public health efforts of national governments all across the world.

The April 2021 World Economic Outlook (WEO) noted that advanced, emerging and developing economies were witnessing a 4.7% and 2.2% y-o-y de-growth in 2020, respectively.

Effective policies are essential to forestall the possibility of worse outcomes, and the necessary measures to reduce contagion and protect lives are an important investment in long-term human and economic health. Because the economic fallout is acute in specific sectors, policymakers will need to implement substantial targeted fiscal, monetary, and financial market measures to support affected households and businesses domestically. And internationally, strong multilateral cooperation is essential to overcome the effects of the pandemic, including to help financially constrained countries facing twin health and funding shocks, and for channelling aid to countries with weak health care systems.

b) **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:**

The total revenue (net) of the Company for the year ended 31st March 2021, decreased by 85.50% and stood at ₹ 106.64 Lakhs as against ₹ 735.68 in the previous year. During the year the Company has incurred losses of ₹ 17.61 lakhs as against loss of ₹ 204.26 lakhs in the previous year. The year under review was adversely affected due to stressed working capital and liquidity crunch thereby affecting the earning capacity of the Company. The performance during the year was not satisfactory due to various reasons beyond the control of the Management. The products in which the Company is dealing, is facing cutthroat competition. At the same time, the costs have increased due to inflation in the economy and devaluation of Rupee against the foreign currencies. Due to this, the Company is currently facing liquidity mismatch wherein it is not generating enough cash flows to meet its debt obligations on time. Further there is huge dumping of the products from China and other countries which has resulted in the stiff competition and price reduction which has resulted in lower capacity utilization.

Further the COVID-19's impact on our lives and economy has been earth shattering. The lockdowns and restrictions have sent the global supply chain in disarray and have halted industrial growth and have brought to the fore the importance of building domestic manufacturing facilities.

e) KEY CHALLENGES TO STEEL INDUSTRY

To stop the pandemic on its vicious path, the nation has been put under extended lockdown. While steel industry has been barely able to function under such a constraints, absence of workers or logistical support are creating roadblock. In this issue we continue to seek important insights from the key players in this sector on how they are bravely facing up to the challenge.

During this pressing time when the whole world in under an economic shock and all industries are facing equally analogous issues, steel industry is no exception. The industry is facing turmoil in terms of raw materials availability, supply disruptions and demand fluctuations. There has been a drastic decline in the consumption pattern during this pandemic and every industry has faced the wrath of it.

We have our ears on the ground listening to all problems, pain areas and requirement our customers' post lockdown and have already chalked out a contingency plan to help them return to normalcy in their production operations. The Lockdown has helped us buy some time from our busy schedule to ponder on improvement programs, technological up-gradation and also increased our appetite to take risks by accepting innovative home-grown solutions for age-old traditional problems.

Key challenges would be (a) availability of labour, since most of the work force has returned back to their home towns and are not expected back early; (b) continue normal working while maintaining "social distancing" since present working arrangement is not suitable for this. This will automatically reduce productivity leading to a strain on both top and bottom line; (c) fear of imposition of intermittent lock downs if Covid cases show a steep rise. This will greatly affect continuity in working and (d) Since our business is greatly dependent on air/train/road travel and since there seems to be no clarity on restart/regularization of this, it is bound to affect business.

The slowdown, further aggravated by the lockdown due to Covid-19 outbreak, has certainly had a negative impact on our company but we have coped to the extent possible. All work which could be carried out from home like engineering activities, coordination with customers on technological questions, have been done via VPN connectivity.

d) INDUSTRY STRUCTURE AND DEVELOPMENTS:

Our Company is engaged in the business of manufacturing Bright Steel Bars and wires and is in the market to sell domestically and in exports since 1974. The Quality control and manufacturing process consist of in-house treatment and has standard quality name for more than 2 decades. Due to financial constraints, the company is been depending on business of processing steel on job work basis to maintain better economics and has successfully been able to achieve job work production. The Company also has indulged in the special heat treatment job in order to establish future market of Hardened & Tempered steel for exports as well as domestic, which will pave the path of revival and re-instating the strength of the company.

DOMESTIC MARKET: -

In FY 2020-21, the Indian economy witnessed a V-shaped recovery after experiencing a technical recession for two consecutive quarters.

The year was a testament to both India's underlying strengths and fault lines. The course of the COVID-19 spread was the primary determinant of economic movement in the country, as it was around the world. As the pandemic reached India, the Union Government rightly prioritised life and health above everything else, and initiated consecutive lockdowns of varying degrees to restrict public movement and manage the health infrastructure. With 65% of the economy locked down, India stood witness to a historical gross domestic product (GDP) de-growth of 24.4% in Q1 FY21 (Source: Provisional National Income estimates by the National Statistical Office). However, as the lockdowns eased, the GDP movement was moderated in the subsequent quarter before entering positive growth territory in Q3 FY21. At a y-o-y level, the NSO estimates that the GDP contracted by 7.3% in FY 2020-21, and gross value added (GVA)

fell by 6.2%. Going forward, the IMF expects India to register a growth of 9.5% and 8.5% in FY 2021-22 and FY 2022-23, respectively, on the back of a lower base, ability to mitigate risks from newer COVID-19 waves, and offtake of government programmes spurring investments and activity. India's faster-than-expected recovery was driven by concerted efforts in the form of fiscal, monetary and budgetary interventions by the Government of India. These will further augment India's growth trajectory.

COVID-19 pandemic severely disrupted domestic demand, in particular during the month of April. However, there is a recovery visible in the market.

We are seeing the domestic market recover and that's a reason why our operations are running at full capacity.

There has been a substantial change of steel requirement in the domestic as well as international market for the consumption of Bright Steel Bars and wires. Majority of Bright Steel Bars and wires are used for making the various kinds of components for Automotive industry, Machinery manufacturing industry, Dairy & food processing industry, chemical and fertilizer industry, electronics and electrical appliances industry along with computer industry. Due to global interaction and industrial change in domestic market, various companies have invested especially in automobile industry and electrical appliances industry along with computer industry. As your company has been well versed with international business, quality specifications, end market trends, which will be convenient and easy for the company to capture such trends. Various trial orders and sample approvals and certain bulk supplies have been established during the year to continue the pace with domestic market.

INTERNATIONAL MARKET: -

Globally, steel is being viewed as a material that can cater to the needs of the present as well as the future. Post-pandemic, as nations and economies build back, the role steel will play is significant. It will also occupy centre stage in 'building back better', with its inherently circular characteristics such as infinite recyclability and ability to build structures that last.

The Company is well established for selling and marketing Stainless Steel Bright Bars internationally in most of the developing countries and has maintained their market share. In the international scenario for Stainless Steel Bright Bars business has been on the greater recessionary trend for few years due to which the company has to go through the constant survival problems. But, at the same time, due to long term standing in the market, the company has been able to maintain its market outside India for Stainless Bright Bars and capturing orders and executing the same with the various financial arrangements. Short term spurts of improved demand has been affecting the company to regain its position from time to time in the international market, but the consistent improvement has been lacking in the international market since long time. The company has still been able to remain in the market even with these trends as well recessionary trends. As known worldwide, Indian steel has faced a lot of antidumping suits for Bright Steel Bars from European Community, U.S.A., Canada, the company has successfully being able to fight such anti-dumping petition and retain reasonable supplies to these countries and struggle to retain its position even at low profitability.

e) OPPORTUNITIES AND THREATS

OPPORTUNITIES

- India continues to be the world's second largest steel producer and consumer at an aggregate level. The country has been witnessing increasing industry consolidation and stronger integration across steel value chains of major producers. The call for India to be self-reliant will be significantly supported by the use of steel as a customisable building material across various conventional and value-added use cases. In FY 2020-21, India's steel sector witnessed an initial downturn, with government-mandated lockdowns hampering production. However, towards the end of the second quarter, capacity utilisation was restored in most plants. For Indian companies, the export scenario remained a key enabler, helping in the offtake of their inventory at better prices. However, as domestic prices were nearly on par with the global commodity movement, steelmakers refocused on the domestic markets. Input prices remained elevated.
- ➤ The Company is engaged in the business since more than forty-five years and has expertise for marketing and quality maintenance of international quality standards for more than 2 decades and enjoys the market share in developed countries like United States and European market.
- > So far, our governing administrations have been very proactive in taking all possible measures to restrict the spread of this pandemic in our country. We are optimistic that in the coming months and weeks we would be able to contain this threat. We expect the demand to start picking up gradually and the economy settles down back to its original pristine.
- ➤ We believe that with accurate indigenous refractory solutions, we can reduce import dependency and provide 'Best of the Worlds' solutions through 'Make in India' to our customers. We are keeping a close watch on customer refractory requirements to address the critical areas in the Iron and Steel industry.
- Boding well for both exporters and domestic players in India, China has imposed fresh tariffs for steel exports, to support its rising domestic steel consumption. This is expected to create a sizeable vacuum and open up export opportunity for Indian players. It would also reduce dumping and re-route steel to India's domestic market, creating demand for steel made in India.

f) THREATS

- As the major product of the company is made of Stainless Steel carrying high nickel (metal) which is a sensitive item quoted in LME (London Metal Exchange), the fluctuation may affect the business opportunities and its profitability.
- > As company's major business is depending on exports the fluctuation in foreign currency may also affect the profitability.

2) SEGMENT-WISE PERFORMANCE

The Company has in the last few years developed various heat treatment processes and successfully supplied commercial lots of heat-treated bars to specific standards in the international market in American, German standards. The scope of business is huge and normal, as this product is utilized and acceptable for various applications in the Engineering industries including Petro Chemical, Oil & Natural gas and Automotive industries worldwide. The company is looking for better profitability business and this kind of supplies keeping the edge over the other competitors. Stringent quality standards and method of processing has been introduced to achieve better reliability and traceability for these kinds of products which is mandatory for extending marketing. The international players and competitors for such products are from Italy, Spain and Korea, but with such renowned and established competitors, the company has been able to stand in the international market, establishing its product range internationally.

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h) **HUMAN RESOURCE**

The Company takes pride in the commitment, competence and dedication shown by its employees in all areas of business. The company's belief is that its people are the primary source of its competitive advantage and consistently puts emphasis on Human Resource Development, which remains vital and strategic to the company. The Company is committed to nurturing, enhancing and retaining talent through Learning & Organizational Development to support the organization's growth and its sustainability in the long run. Cordial employee relations, in keeping with tradition, are being pursued vigorously. Industrial relations have continued to be harmonious throughout the year. This has been possible by creating a performance driven culture against the backdrop of care and concern for all employees. Objective appraisal systems based on Key Result Areas (KRAs) are in place.

The backbone of steel consumption is the push for infrastructure development and generation of employment. Infrastructure development itself would consume steel. Higher employment/better wages would mean that consumers would spend on consumer durables, automobiles etc. which would in turn further fuel the steel industry. This infrastructure development has to center around rural India.

i) RETURN ON NET WORTH:

Return on Net worth during the previous and current financial year is negative due to losses.

i) OUTLOOK FOR THE FUTURE

GFL expects the steel upcycle to continue in the near-to-medium term, given the structural changes that are reshaping the global steel sector, such as the Chinese restriction on exports, ongoing geopolitical dynamics and concerted public expenditure across the world. At an India level, the second wave of COVID-19 has put temporary brakes on an otherwise fast-paced recovery. GFL is committed to serving the nation and has provided whatever support was necessary across the board. From a business standpoint, the Company remains bullish on the India opportunity, which is driven by rising infrastructure projects, accelerated vaccination, policy continuity and a government-led push for self-reliance. GFL's expansion and strategic divestments, and other initiatives are directed at making the best of this opportunity. The Company is also looking at export markets as a strong driver and going forward.

k) INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS

The Company has proper and adequate systems of Internal Control to ensure that all the assets are safeguarded from loss, damage or disposition. Checks & balances are in place to ensure that transactions are adequately authorised and recorded and that they are reported correctly. The Board of Directors considers internal controls as adequate as it regularly reviews the findings and recommendations of internal audit.

I) FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE WITH RESPECT TO OPERATIONAL PERFORMANCE

During the previous year the major source of income consisted of exports /sales whereas in the current year commission has been derived from the exports/sales passed onto fellow industries to maintain the marketing strength of the company. The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Section 134 of the Companies Act, 2013 and accounting principles generally accepted in India, including Indian Accounting Standards. The results of the operations are discussed in the Boards' Report.

As on 31st March, 2021 the Board of Directors comprises of six Directors out of which three are Independent Directors. The Chairman of the Board is an Executive Director. The composition of the Board of Directors as on 31st March, 2021 is in conformity with the provisions of the Act and Regulation 17 of Listing Regulations.

None of the Directors on the Board holds directorships in more than ten public companies. None of the Independent Directors serves as an independent director in more than seven listed entities. None of the Directors is are related to each other.

m) COMMITTEES OF THE BOARD:

NOTES FORMING PART OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. General Information

Grand Foundry Limited is incorporated in India in March 1973 under the Indian Companies Act,1956. The company is engaged in manufaturing of Bright Steel bars and wires. The company's products are utilized for various applications in the engineering industries, including petro chemical, oil and natural gas and automative industries throughout the world. The company supplies every grade of steel required by the engineering industry to customers spread out throughout Indian and countries, such as the United States, Japan, Singapore, Italy, Australia and Canada. The company also offers pickling and heat treatment lines.

2. Significant Accounting Policies:

2.1 Statement of Compliance :

These Financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards (referred to as "Ind AS") as prescribed under section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as amended from time to time.

2.2 Current non-current Classification

All assets and liablities have been classified as current and non-current as per the company's normal operating cycle (12 months) and other criteria set out in the Schedule III of the Act and Ind AS 1 Presentation of financial statements. Based on the nature of products and the time between the acquisition of assets for processing and their realisation, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current / non-current Classification of assets and liabilities.

Assets:

An Asset is classified as current when it satisifies any of the following criteria:

It is expected to be realised in, or is intended for sale or consumption in, the Company's normal operating cycle.

It is held primarily for the purpose of being traded

It is expected to be realised within 12 months after the reporting date; or

It is a cash and cash equivalent unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date.

Liabilites:

A Liability is classified as current when it satisifies any of the following criteria:

It is expected to settle in the Company's normal operating cycle;

It is held primarily for the purpose of trading

It is due to be settled within 12 months after the reporting date;

The company's Borad of Directors approves the financial statements For issue on May 29, 2019. The aforesaid financial statement have been prepared in Indian Rupee.

2.3 Foreign Currencies:

Transactions in the foreign currencies are recognised at the prevailing exchange rates on the transaction dates. Realised gains and lossess on the settlement of foreign currency transactions are recognised in the statement of Profit and loss.

2.4 Borrowing Cost

Borrowing cost include interest,fees and other charges incurred in connection with the borrowing of funds and is considered as revenue expenditure for the year in which it is incurred except for borrowing cost attributed to the acquition/ improvement of qualifying capital assets and incurred till the commencement of commercial use of the assets and which is capitalised as cost of the assets.

2.5 Porperty, plant and Equipment

Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment if any. Cost includes qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalised in accordance with the company's accounting policy and includes all other expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items. Depreciation has been provided on Written Down value and straight line method as per the useful life prescribed in Schedule II to the Companies Act,2013. the estimated usage of the assets, the operation condition of the asset, past history of replacement, anticipated technological changes, manufaturers warrants and maintenance support etc.,

Estimated useful lives of the assets are as follows:

Class of Assets Years
Furniture and Fixtures 6-7 years

Vehicles 6-7 years

The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis. Fixed assets are derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the assets. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of any fixed assets are determined as the differnce between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the assets and are recognised in profit or loss.

2.6 Inventories

Inventories are stated at the Raw material cost value.

Income Tax

The income tax expense or credit for the period is the tax payable on the current period's taxable income based on the applicable income tax rate adjusted by changes in deferred tax assets and liabilities attributable to temporary differences and to unused tax losses.

The Company's liability for current tax is calculated using the Indian tax rates and laws that have been enacted by the reporting date. The Company periodically evaluates the positions taken in the tax returns with respect to situations in which applicable tax regulations are subject to interpretations and provisions where appropriate.

Deferred income tax is provided in full, using the liability method on temporary differences arising between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amount in the financial statements. Deferred income tax is determined using tax rates (and laws) that have been enacted or substantially enacted by the end of the reporting period and are expected to apply when the related deffered income tax assets is realised or the deferred income tax liability is settled.

Deferred tax assets are recognised for all deductible temporary differences and unused tax losses, only if, it is probable that future taxable amounts will be available to utilise those temporary differences and losses.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset when there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax assets and current tax liabilities and when the deferred tax balances relate to the same taxation authority. Current tax assets and tax liabilities are offset where the Company has a legally enforceable right to offset and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realize the asset and settle the liability simultaneously

Current and deferred tax is recognised in the Statement of Profit and Loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, the tax is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Minimum Alternate Tax (MAT) credit is recognised as deferred tax asset only when and to the extent there is convincing evidence that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period. Such asset is reviewed at each Balance Sheet date and the carrying amount of the MAT credit asset is written down to the extent there is no longer a convincing evidence to the effect that the Company will pay normal income tax during the specified period.

Employee Benefits

Short-term Obligations

All employee benefits payable wholly within twelve months of rendering the service are classified as short term employee benefits and they are recognized in the period in which the employee renders the related service. The Company recognizes the undiscounted amount of short term employee benefits expected to be paid in exchange for services rendered as a liability (accrued expense) after deducting any amount already paid.

2.7 Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Company has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the company will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. The amount recognised as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligations its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows (when the ettect of the time value of money is material)

When some or all the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognised as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

2.8 Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purpose of presentation in the statement of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, Current bank balances held at call with banks.

2.9 Earning Per Share

Basic earning per share is computed by dividing the profit/(loss) after tax by the weighted average number of equity shares outstaning during the year. The weighted average number of equity shares outstaning during the year is adjusted for treasury shares, bonus issue, bonus element in a rights issue to existing shareholders share split and reverse share split. Diluted earnings per share is computed by dividing the profit/(loss) after tax as adjusted for dividend, interest and other charges to expense or income (net of any attributable taxes) relating to the dilutive potential equity shares, by the weighted average number of equity shares considered for deriving basic earnings per share and the weighted

average number of equity shares which could have been issued on the conversion of all dilutive potential equity shares including the treasury shares held by the company to satisfy the exercise of the share options by the employees.

Major Events and future prospects

SECURITY EXCHANGE BOARD OF INDIA (SEBI) to consider:

To grant exemption to the company from the provisions of SEBI Guidelines for Preferential Allotment of Shares, SEBI (Substantial Acquisition of shares & Takeovers) Regulations, 1997, SEBI (Disclosure & Investor Protection) Guidelines, 2000, SEBI (Central Listing Authority) Regulations, 200 and ceiling on promoters holding and any other applicable Rules and Regulations for the issue of equity shares to the Promoters as envisaged under the Scheme, provided such equity shares shall be locked in for a period of one year in case allottees are non-promoters.

NATIONAL STOCK EXCHANGE/BOMBAY STOCK EXCHANGE to consider:

Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future period, if the revision current and future period

A Key sources of estimation uncertainty

i Contingencies

In the normal course of business, contingent liabilities may arise from litigation and other claims against the Company. Potential liabilities that are possible but not probable of crystallising or are very difficult to qualify reliably are treated as contingent liabilities. Such liabilities are disclosed in the notes are not recognised.

ii Provisions and liabilities

Provisions and liabilities are recognised in the period when it becomes probable that there will be a future outflow of funds resulting from past operations or events that can reasonably be estimated.

The timing of recognition requires application of judgement to existing facts and circumtances, which may be subject to change. The amounts are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre- tax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability.

iii Useful lives of Fixed assets

Management reviews the useful lives of Fixed assets at once in a year. Such lives are dependent upon an assessment of both the technical lives of the assets and also their likely economic lives based on various internal and external factors including relative efficiency and operating costs. Accordingly depreciable lives are reviewed annually using the best information available to the management.
