N KOREA TEST FIRES MISSILE INTO SEA

North Korea on Tuesday fired at least one ballistic missile into the sea in what South Korea's military described as a weapon likely designed for submarine-based launches, marking possibly the most significant demonstration of the North's military might since President Joe Biden took office.

The launch came hours after the U.S. reaffirmed its offer to resume diplomacy on North Korea's nuclear weapons program. It underscored how the North continues to expand its military capabilities amid a pause in diplomacy.

The South's Joint Chiefs of Staff said in a statement it detected the North firing one short-range missile it believed was a submarine-launched ballistic missile from waters near the eastern port of Sinpo, and that the South Korean and U.S. militaries were closely analyzing the launch.

SLBMs. After the launch, Kishida interrupted a campaign trip ahead of Japanese legislative elections later this month, returning to Tokyo. The leader ordered his government to start revising the country's national security strategy to adapt to North Korea's growing threats.

velopment in missile technology and its impact on the security of Japan and in the region," he said.

South Korean officials held a national security council meeting and expressed "deep regret" over the launch that came despite efforts to revive diplomacy. A strong South

Korean response could anger North Korea, which has accused Seoul of hypocrisy for criticising the North's weapons tests while expanding its own conventional military capabilities.

The apparent site of the missile firing - a shipyard in Sinpo - is a major de-

fense industry hub where North Korea focuses its submarine production. In recent years, the North has also used Sinpo to develop ballistic weapons systems designed to be fired from submarines.

North Korea had last tested an SLBM in October 2019.

Pak may remain on FATF grey list

The upcoming 3 day meeting of the FATF in Paris, scheduled to start on Wednesday, will be assessing and discussing Pakistan's progress and compliance to the 27-point action plan

Pakistan is expected to remain on the grey list of the Financial Action Task Force (FATF) till April 2022, as the country works towards completing an action plan to counter money laundering and terrorism financing.

As per sources, the upcoming three-day meeting of the FATF in Paris, scheduled to start on Wednesday, will be assessing and discussing Pakistan's progress and compliance to the 27-point action plan to curb money laundering and terrorist financing.

Pakistan's name is expected to remain on the grey list till the next session of the FATF in April 2022, because of its failure to ensure complete compliance with action plan, which it was presented by the watchdog's regional partner, the Asia Pacific Group (APG).

Pakistan failed in completing at least six out of the 27-point action plan in its previous assessment at the FATF, which includ-

ed enhancing international cooperation and demonstrating that assistance is being sought from foreign countries in implementing UN Security Council designations.

FATF assessments hold great importance for Pakistan as financial donors including International Monetary Fund (IMF), UN and the Egmont Group of Financial Intelligence Units are also going to be part of the FATF meeting as observer organisations.

The FATF said in a statement that it "will finalise key reports, including the revised guidance on virtual assets and their service providers and discuss the next steps to strengthen its standards on transparency of beneficial ownership".

Man dies after falling from hot air balloon

TEL AVIV: A man is dead after falling Tuesday from a hot air balloon mid-flight, Israeli police said.

Police say the man, in his 20s, was a crew member who had been dangling from the basket when he fell from an unspecified height.

Local police official Slava Bonchuk told Israeli Army Radio that an initial investigation revealed that the hot air balloon appears to have taken off with the man attached to the basket. Slava Bonchuk said passersby on the ground alerted police to the hanging crewman, who then informed the pilot. The man plummeted before the pilot was able to land the hot air balloon.

Israeli media reported the man fell onto a passing car on a highway below, in a rural area of northern Israel. Police said they have sealed off the area and are investigating the incident.

A 96-year-old former secretary for the Stutthof concentration camp's SS commander appeared before a court in northern Germany on Tuesday to formally hear the charges against her.

The indictment read out before the state court in Itzehoe, near Hamburg, charges Irmgard Furchner with more than 11,000 counts of accessory to murder.

Furchner had tried to skip the start of her trial last month but was later picked up by police and placed in detention for several days.

The defendant did not respond to the allegations leveled against her Tuesday. The trial is scheduled

to continue on October 26. Tens of thousands of people died at Stutthof and its satellite camps, or on so-called death marches at the end of the war.

Furchner is being tried in juvenile court because she was under 21 at the time of the alleged crimes.

US envoy to Af steps down

Top US envoy to Afghanistan Zalmay Khalilzad is stepping down, the State Department said on Monday, less than two months after the chaotic US withdrawal from Afghanistan and the Taliban takeover of the country.

Khalilzad will be replaced by his deputy, Tom West, Secretary of State Antony Blinken said in a statement, noting that West will work closely with the US embassy, which is now based in Doha, on US interests in Afghanistan.

West, who earlier served on the Vice President's national security team and the National Security Council staff, will lead diplomatic efforts and advise the Secretary and Assistant Secretary for the Bureau of South and Cen-

tral Asian Affairs. "As Special Representative for Afghan Reconciliation Zalmay Khalilzad steps down from his role. I extend my gratitude for his decades of service to the American people," Blinken said.

A person familiar with the matter said on condition of anonymity that Khalilzad submitted his resignation on Friday.

Taliban's FM to meet Chinese counterpart

KABUL: Afghanistan's acting Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi will meet his Chinese counterpart Wang Yi, a Taliban official said.

This comes after Afghanistan's acting Foreign Minister Mawlawi Amir Khan Muttaqi met Wang Yu, Ambassador of China to Kabul on Sunday evening.

Abdul Qahar Balkhi, spokesperson for the Taliban's interim Foreign Ministry announced on Twitter that during the meeting, both sides agreed on convening a meeting between Foreign Ministers of the two countries.

Indian fugitive arrested in Philippines
PARANAQUE CITY (PHILIPPINES): An Indian fugitive have been arrested in the Philippines' city of Paranaque, local media reported. The City police chief identified the fugitive as Suresh Basapa Puri with aliases Satish Shekhar Pai and Suresh Pujari, lodged at Chateau Elysee, Dona Soledad, Barangay Don Bosco, Manila Bulletin reported. Suresh Pujari, is reportedly a gangster, who is wanted for several extortion cases in Maharashtra. The arrest took place in the Don Bosco administrative region on Thursday afternoon. Currently, he is in police custody. A combined operation from city police intelligence, the fugitive search unit led to Puri's arrest at about 4 pm on Thursday.

Kazakhstan sends 4,000 tonnes of flour to Af
KABUL: Officials of Afghanistan's Balkh province have said that Kazakhstan provided more than 4,000 tonnes of flour as humanitarian aid to Afghanistan, reported local media. Head of the National Disaster Management Department in Balkh province, Abdul Latif said that it came across the border at Hairatan and the aid will be distributed to vulnerable and needy families, reported TOLNews. Expressing his gratitude towards Kazakhstan, Latif said: "We are grateful for Kazakhstan's president and its people who helped the Afghan people in such a critical condition."

29 caught cheating on Korean language test
SEOUL: Twenty-nine foreign nationals got caught cheating on a recent Korean language proficiency test, the organiser of the test said on Tuesday. According to South Korea's National Institute for International Education, the foreigners either disobeyed supervisors' order to turn in their phones and other mobile gadgets or were caught possessing forbidden electronic devices while taking the Test of Proficiency in Korean (TOPIK) at a school in Seoul's Gangdong district on Sunday, reports Yonhap News Agency. Of them, 13 were Chinese and nine others were Vietnamese nationals. They also included two Kazakh nationals and two Japanese people. Additionally, two Korean nationals were also caught cheating on the test.

Campaigning begins for Japan's general election

TOKYO: Campaigning for Japan's October 31 general election started on Tuesday, with Prime Minister Fumio Kishida seeking authorisation for his Covid-19 and economic policies and the opposition parties united to loosen the power of the ruling coalition. In the campaigning, candidates are competing for 465 seats in the powerful lower house or the House of Representatives, reports Xinhua news agency. The ruling Liberal Democratic Party (LDP) and its smaller partner Komeito hope to maintain their overall majority. Leading the LDP, Kishida has vowed to achieve economic growth and redistribute wealth to the middle class in the revision of the "Abenomics" which has been criticized as helping raise corporate earnings and stock prices, but failing to boost wage growth.

6.0 magnitude quake hits Greece
KARPATHOS: An earthquake with a magnitude of 6.0 jolted 149 km Southeast of Karpathos, Greece at 05:32 GMT on Tuesday, the U.S. Geological Survey said. The epicenter, with a depth of 37.84 km, was initially determined to be at 34.5727 degrees north latitude and 28.3919 degrees east longitude. No casualties have been reported yet.

Nearly 100 women sworn in as judges in Egypt

CAIRO: Nearly 100 women Tuesday became the first female judges to join Egypt's State Council, one of the country's main judicial bodies. The 98 women were sworn in before the council's chief judge, Mohammed Hossam el-Din, in a celebratory event in Cairo.

The swearing-in came months after President Abdel Fattah el-Sissi asked for women to join the State Council and the Public Prosecution, the two judicial bodies that until recently were exclusively male.

El-Sissi's decision in March was applauded by many women's rights activists. Egypt's National Council for Women said at the time that the move represented a political will to further empower women. Established in 1946, the State Council is an independent judicial body.

DISASTER WARNING

Africa's rare glaciers soon to disappear

Africa's rare glaciers will disappear in the next two decades because of climate change, a new report warned Tuesday amid sweeping forecasts of pain for the continent that contributes least to global warming but will suffer from it most.

The report from the World Meteorological Organization and other agencies, released ahead of the U.N. climate conference in Scotland that starts Oct. 31, is a grim reminder that Africa's 1.3 billion people

remain "extremely vulnerable" as the continent warms more, and at a faster rate, than the global average. And yet Africa's 54 countries are responsible for less than 4% of global greenhouse gas emissions.

The new report seizes on the shrinking glaciers of Mount Kilimanjaro, Mount Kenya and the Rwenzori Mountains in Uganda as symbols of the rapid and widespread changes to come. "Their current retreat rates are higher than the global average. If this continues, it will lead to total deglaciation by the 2040s," it says.

Massive displacement, hunger and increasing climate shocks such as droughts and flooding are in the future, and yet the lack of cli-

mate data in parts of Africa "is having a major impact" on disaster warnings for millions of people, WMO Secretary-General Petteri Taalas said at Tuesday's launch.

Estimates of the economic effects of climate change vary across the African continent, but "in sub-Saharan Africa, climate change could further lower gross domestic product by up to 3% by 2050," Josefa Leonel Correia Sacko with the African Union Commission writes in the report.

COVID-19 BRIEF

COVID-19 vaccines and prior coronavirus infections can provide broad immunity against other, similar coronaviruses, according to a study. The findings, published in the Journal of Clinical Investigation, build a rationale for universal coronavirus vaccines that could prove useful in the face of future epidemics. "Until our study, what hasn't been clear is if you get exposed to one coronavirus, could you have cross-protection across other coronaviruses? And we showed that is the case," said study lead author Pablo Penaloza-MacMaster, assistant professor at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine, US.

Latvia will enter into a nearly month-long lockdown, including a curfew, on Thursday due to the worsening coronavirus situation in the Baltic country where the vaccination rate is among the lowest in the European Union. Following an emergency government meeting late Monday, Latvian Prime Minister Krisjanis Karins said that the lockdown from Oct. 21 until Nov. 15 and accompanying drastic measures are needed as the pandemic continues to spread quickly, causing hospital wards to fill up with COVID-19 patients amid scarce health care resources.

Coronavirus restrictions in the Australian capital will be further eased after it reached the 80 per cent vaccine milestone, authorities said on Tuesday. The Australian Capital Territory (ACT) became the country's first jurisdiction to hit 80 per cent double-dose vaccination coverage among those aged above 12, reports Xinhua news agency. As a result, non-essential retail in Canberra will be allowed to open on Friday for the first time since August 12 in a major boost for the ACT's economy.

Pakistan reported 603 new COVID-19 cases over the past 24 hours, the National Command and Operation Center (NCO) said on Tuesday. The overall tally of the infected people climbed to 1,265,650 across the country, said the NCO, the department leading Pakistan's campaign against the pandemic. Pakistan's southern Sindh province has been the worst hit, with a total of 466,154 cases, followed by eastern Punjab province where the virus was detected in 438,133 people.
