# Taliban takes Af's third-largest city in onslaught

# Taiwan, US coast guards meet despite Chinese pressure

The Taliban captured Afghanistan's third-largest city and a strategic provincial capital near Kabul on Thursday, further squeezing the country's embattled government just weeks before the end of the American military mission there.

Taliban, which has taken 11 of Afghanistan's 34 provincial capitals as part of a weeklong blitz. The capture of Ghazni, meanwhile, cuts off a crucial highway linking the Afghan capital with the country's southern provinces, which similarly find themselves under assault as part of an insurgent push some 20 years after U.S. And NATO troops invaded and ousted the Taliban government.

While Kabul itself isn't directly under threat yet, the losses and the battles elsewhere further tighten the grip of a resurgent Taliban estimated to now hold some two-thirds of the nation. Thousands of people have fled their

homes amid fears the Taliban will again impose a brutal, repressive government, all but eliminating women's rights

## Some Afghans blame Pakistan for Taliban gains

**Peshawar:** When Wahab disappeared from his home in Afghanistan to sign on for jihad, it was in neighbouring Pakistan that he got his training. The 20-year-old was recruited by childhood friends and was taken to a militant outpost in Parachinar, on Pakistan's rugged mountainous border with Afghanistan. There, he underwent training, preparing to fight alongside the Afghan Taliban, a relative told The Associated Press, speaking on condition of anonymity because of fear of reprisals from militants and government security agents. As the Taliban swiftly capture territory in Afghanistan, many Afghans blame Pakistan for the insurgents' success, pointing to their use of Pakistani territory in multiple ways. Pressure is mounting on Islamabad, which initially brought the Taliban to the negotiating table, to get them to stop the onslaught and go back to talks. While analysts say Pakistan's leverage is often overstated, it does permit the Taliban leadership on its territory and its wounded warriors receive treatment in Pakistani hospitals. AP

## US keeping distance as Afghan forces face Taliban rout

Afghan Government forces are collapsing even faster than US military leaders thought possible just a few months ago when President Joe Biden ordered a full withdrawal. But there's little appetite at the White House, the Pentagon or among the American public for trying to stop the rout and it probably is too late to do so. Biden has made clear he has no intention of reversing the decision he made last spring, even as the outcome seems to point toward a Taliban takeover. With most US troops now gone and the Taliban accelerating their battlefield gains, American military leaders are not pressing him to change his mind. They know that the only significant option would be for the president to restart the war he already decided to end.

The Taliban, who ruled the country from 1996 until US forces invaded after the 9/11 attacks, captured three more provincial capitals Wednesday and another on Thursday, the 10th the insurgents have taken in a weeklong sweep that has given them effective control of about two-thirds of the country. The insurgents have no air force and are outnumbered by U.S.-trained Afghan defense forces, but they have captured territory with stunning speed. John Kirby, the chief Pentagon spokesman, said the Afghans still have time to save themselves from final defeat. "No potential outcome has to be inevitable, including the fall of Kabul," Kirby told reporters. "It doesn't have to be that way. It really depends on what kind of political and military leadership the Afghans can muster to turn this around."

## US sees Pakistan useful only for clearing mess in Afghanistan: Imran

Taking a dig at the US, Prime Minister Imran Khan has said that Washington sees Pakistan as "useful" only for clearing the "mess" it has left behind in Afghanistan after 20 years of fighting and prefers India when it comes to forming a "strategic partnership". Afghanistan has seen an uptick in violence by the Taliban after US President Joe Biden's announcement of the

withdrawal of American and NATO troops by August 31. "Pakistan is just considered only to be useful in the context of somehow settling this mess which has been left behind after 20 years of trying to find a military solution when there was no one," Khan told foreign journalists at his home here on Wednesday. Khan said that since the US decided to have a "strategic partnership" with India, Washington was treating Pakistan differently, according to a journalist present at the meeting. Islamabad is unhappy that Biden has not spoken to Prime Minister Khan since he assumed the presidency in January. Pakistan's National Security Adviser Moeed Yusuf recently expressed disappointment over President Biden's reluctance to contact Prime Minister Khan despite considering Islamabad as an important country in some critical issues like Afghanistan.

## Nearly four lakh people newly displaced in Afghanistan by conflict since start of year: UN

Nearly four lakh people have been newly displaced in Afghanistan since the start of the year, with a huge spike from May, a spokesperson for UN chief Antonio Guterres has said, amid the deteriorating security situation in the war-torn country. The US has already pulled back most of its forces from Afghanistan and is looking to complete the drawdown by August 31, ending nearly two-decade of its military presence in the country. Afghanistan has been witnessing a series of terror attacks since the US began withdrawing its troops on May 1. The Taliban insurgents have overrun one-quarter of Afghanistan's provincial capitals. "Since the start of the year, nearly 390,000 people have been newly displaced by conflict across the country, with a huge spike since May," Spokesman for the Secretary General Guterres, Stephane Dujarric said at the daily press briefing on Wednesday. He said according to UN humani-

tarian colleagues, between July 1 and August 5, 2021, the humanitarian community verified that 5,800 internally displaced persons (IDPs) have arrived in Kabul and are seeking safety from the conflict and other threats. They have received assistance including food, household items, water and sanitation support. Dujarric said most of the internally displaced persons staying in Kabul are hosted by friends and family, but a growing number are staying in the open. Ten teams were deployed to assess the situation for people staying outside in parks and open spaces. "They identified an additional 4,522 displaced men, women and children in need of shelter, food, sanitation and drinking water. A temporary health clinic and mobile health teams are providing health services to these people," he said. Despite a worsening security situation, humanitarian agencies are staying and delivering to people in need, reaching 7.8 million people in the first six months of this year.

## Denmark to evacuate Afghans who worked for Kabul embassy

Danish lawmakers have agreed to evacuate 45 Afghan citizens who worked for Denmark's government in Afghanistan and to offer them residency in the European country for two years. The plan approved Wednesday applies to people who worked at the Danish Embassy in Kabul and as interpreters for Danish troops. Denmark, like other Western nations including the US, recently pulled its remaining troops out of Afghanistan. Denmark opened its embassy in Kabul in 2006. Current and former embassy employees from within the past two years are eligible for evacuation along with their spouses and children. The effort to get them out of Afghanistan must begin as soon as possible but be carried out gradually "so that the embassy still can function," according to a foreign ministry statement.

## Israel's envoy inaugurates diplomatic mission in Morocco

Israel's foreign minister on Thursday inaugurated the country's diplomatic representation in Morocco, a symbol of the normalisation of the relations between the two nations. Yair Lapid's two-day visit is the first to the country by an Israeli minister since 2003. It comes less than a year after Israel and Morocco reached a deal to establish formal ties under the U.S.-brokered "Abraham Accords." Lapid tweeted pictures of him formally opening the Israeli liaison office in Rabat, the capital, alongside the Morocco's Foreign Affairs Deputy Minister, Mohcine Jazouli. He was then to head to Casablanca where he was to visit a synagogue, the Temple Beth-El. On Wednesday, Lapid met with his Moroccan counterpart Nasser Bourita and both countries signed an air service agreement and another agreement to cooperate in the fields of culture, sports and youth.

They also signed a memorandum of understanding on the establishment of a political consultation mechanism between their countries' foreign ministries, which appeared to fit into the wider design of the face-to-face diplomacy during Lapid's visit. U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken tweeted on Wednesday that the United States congratulates Morocco and Israel "on the reopening of the Israeli Liaison Office in Rabat. We will continue to work with Israel and Morocco to strengthen all aspects of our partnerships." Israel and Morocco had low-level diplomatic relations in the 1990s, but Morocco cut them off after the second Palestinian uprising erupted in 2000. The two countries maintained informal ties, with thousands of Israelis traveling to Morocco each year. The Abraham Accords were struck last year with four Arab states: the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain, Sudan and Morocco.

## Floods that hit northern Turkey leave 11 dead

Turkish authorities said Thursday the death toll from the severe floods and mudslides that struck the north of the country has risen to 11. One other person is reported missing. The floods battered the Black Sea coastal provinces of Bartin, Kastamonu, Sinop and Samsun on Wednesday, demolishing homes and bridges and sweeping away cars. Helicopters scrambled to rescue people stranded on rooftops. As floodwaters began to recede across the affected regions in Turkey's north, a statement from the Disaster and Emergency Management Presidency, or AFAD, said rescuers had recovered six bodies in Kastamonu. Later Thursday, four more bodies were found in the worst-hit town of Bozkurt, in Kastamonu, and one body was found in Sinop. An 80-year-old woman was reported missing in Bartin province. The disaster struck as firefighters in southwest Turkey worked to extinguish a wildfire in Mugla province, an area popular with tourists that runs along the Aegean Sea. The blaze, which was brought under control on Thursday, was one of more than 200 wildfires in Turkey since July 28.

## Pak blames India, Afghanistan for attack on bus carrying Chinese

Pakistan on Thursday alleged that India and Afghanistan were behind last month's suicide attack on a shuttle bus in the country's restive Khyber Pakhtunkhwa province that killed 13 people, including nine Chinese engineers. The bomb attack took place in the Dasu area of Upper Kohistan district where a Chinese company is building a 4,300-megawatt hydropower project on the Indus river. At least 13 people were killed when the bus carrying Chinese engineers and workers to the site of the under-construction Dasu Dam exploded on July 14.

## US aircraft carrier's successful trial test may blunt China's 'killer' missile threat: Report

The US Navy's aircraft carrier Gerald R Ford has successfully withstood an impact trial test of underwater detonation of 20 tonnes of explosives, which observers say could effectively reduce the threat posed by China's "carrier killer" missiles. The US' newest and most advanced nuclear carrier's third and final full ship shock trial was completed on Sunday off the coast of Florida, following the previous such trials on June 18 and July 16, the American navy said in a press release on Monday. Service officials described the shock trial testing - where the Navy detonates 40,000 pounds of ordnance in the water near the hull to test both

the ship and its systems - as a success, with no major injuries, no fires and no flooding, the US Naval Institute's news portal USNI News reported. "We had zero catastrophic failures on the ship, zero situations where we had flooding or anything, and zero fires. All that is pretty significant," Capt. Paul Lanzilotta, Ford's commanding officer, told reporters on Monday. It is a test perhaps most keenly watched by China as the Chinese military since 2015 has been flaunting its DF-21D and DF-26 missiles banded as "carrier killers" which could hit the moving aircraft carriers from a distance of 5,000 kilometers. In the trials, held off the Florida coast in the Atlantic Ocean, 40,000lbs (20 tonnes) of explosives - equivalent to a 3.9-magnitude earthquake - were det-

onated underwater, each time taking place closer to the carrier. Data on the impact on the vessel was collected. "The tests demonstrated - and proved to the crew, fairly dramatically - that the ship will be able to withstand formidable shocks and continue to operate under extreme conditions," said Brian Metcalf, the manager of the navy's future aircraft carrier programme office. "Besides data collection, another reason to announce it was to send a message to China and Russia that the US aircraft carriers have super resilience and they are not worried about Chinese or Russian conventional anti-ship weapons," commentator and former Chinese military instructor Song Zhongping said.
