Blinken warns Central Asia of Ukraine conflict danger

In Kazakhstan for a series of meetings with top Central Asian diplomats, US Secretary of State Antony Blinken said no country, particularly those that have traditionally been in Moscow's orbit, can afford to ignore the threats posed by Russian aggression...

territorial integrity and independence of Kazakhstan and countries across the region," Blinken said after meeting in Astana with the foreign ministers of the so-called C5+1 group...

Kazakhstan has very close and historic ties with both Russia and Ukraine, it would not allow its territory to be used for any Russian aggression or sanctions evasion.

He also said that even though Kazakhstan shares the world's longest land border with Russia, it did not see a threat from Moscow.

Blinken's visit to Astana on Tuesday, and Tashkent, the capital of Uzbekistan on Wednesday, mark his first trip to Central Asia as secretary of state and come just days after the one-year anniversary of Moscow's invasion of Ukraine...

"The last three years have been difficult for the world and developing countries have been hit the hardest," he said. Challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic, rising prices of fuel, fertilisers and foodgrains have adversely affected the enjoyment of human rights by people globally, he said.

"Our collective efforts to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals have been seriously set back," Jaishankar said. "India believes that the world must resolutely display zero tolerance. After all, terrorism is the most indefensible violation of human rights and has no justification in any circumstances. Its perpetrators must, therefore, always be held accountable," he said without naming any country.

Jaishankar calls for decisive action against terrorists

India on Tuesday urged the international community to resolutely display "zero tolerance" towards terrorism, saying the scourge is the most "indefensible violation of human rights" and those perpetrating it should always be held accountable, in a veiled reference to Pakistan.

In a video message at the High-Level Segment of the 52nd session of the UN Human Rights Council, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said India has been at the forefront of dealing with global challenges that impact adversely on human rights, especially terrorism.

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No clear conclusion on Covid-19 origin theory: China

There is no definitive conclusion that the COVID-19 pandemic originated from a lab in China, the White House has said.

The US government is still looking at the pandemic's origin, which has been the subject of vigorous debate among academics, intelligence experts and lawmakers.

National Security Council Coordinator for Strategic Communications John Kirby's remarks came following a report that the US Energy Department has concluded the virus most likely leaked from a lab in China.

The Wall Street Journal on Sunday, citing a classified intelligence report recently provided to the White House and key members of Congress, said the virus that drove the COVID-19 pandemic, killing close to 7 million people globally, most likely emerged from a laboratory leak in China.

Responding to questions about the report, Kirby said: "The intelligence community and the rest of the government are still looking at this. There's not been a definitive conclusion, so it's difficult for me to say, nor should I feel like I should have to defend press reporting about a possible preliminary indication here."

"What the President (Joe Biden) wants is facts. He wants the whole government designed to go get those facts, and that's what we're doing. And we're just not there yet," Kirby told reporters at a daily White House news conference on Monday.

Putin orders tightening of Ukraine border as drones hit Russia

Russian President Vladimir Putin on Tuesday ordered officials to tighten control of the border with Ukraine after a spate of drone attacks that Russian authorities blamed on Kyiv delivered a new challenge to Moscow more than a year after its full-scale invasion of its neighbour.

Pilot injured in copter crash

Moscow (AP): A helicopter crashed near Russia's Arctic port of Murmansk, leaving a pilot with "serious" injuries and three other people only slightly hurt, the Russian Emergency Situations Ministry said on Tuesday.

According to a ministry statement, nine people were travelling in the Mi-8 aircraft from Krasnoselkovo to Lovozero, two remote outposts in Russia's Kola Peninsula east of Murmansk.

The statement said the crash may have been caused by the pilots likely losing control of the aircraft after drifting into a snowy gust. It added that emergency crews were dispatched to the crash site.

Russian authorities. A drone fell near the village of Gubastovo, 100 kilometres (60 miles) from Moscow, Andrei Vorobyov, governor of the region surrounding the Russian capital, said in an online statement.

The drone didn't inflict any damage, Vorobyov said. He didn't specifically describe the drone as Ukrainian, but said that it likely targeted "a civilian infrastructure object."

Pictures of the drone showed it was a Ukrainian-made type. It reportedly has a range of up to 800 kilometres (nearly 500 miles), but isn't capable of carrying a large load of explosives. Russian forces early Tuesday shot down a Ukrainian drone over the Bryansk region, local Gov. Aleksandr Bogomaz said in a Telegram post. He said there were no casualties.

Three drones also targeted Russia's Belgorod region on Monday night, with one flying through an apartment window in its namesake capital, local authorities reported.

Regional Gov Vyacheslav Gladkov said the drones caused minor damage to buildings and cars but no casualties. The Russian Defence Ministry said that Ukraine used drones to attack facilities in the Krasnodar region and neighbouring Adygea.

Migrants paid 8,000 euros for deadly voyage to Italy

Rescue teams pulled another body from the sea on Tuesday, bringing the death toll from Italy's latest migration tragedy to 64, as prosecutors identified suspected smugglers who allegedly charged 8,000 euros (nearly USD 8,500) each for the "voyage of death" from Turkey to Italy.

well as from Pakistan, Syria and Iraq. Rescue teams pulled one body from the sea on Tuesday morning, bringing the death toll to 64, said Andrea Mortato, of the firefighter divers unit.

Crotone prosecutor Giuseppe Capocchia confirmed investigators had identified three suspected smugglers, a Turk and two Pakistani nationals. A second Turk is believed to have escaped or died in the wreck. Italy's customs police said in a statement that crossing organisers charged 8,000 euros (around USD 8,500) each for the "voyage of death."

Interior Minister Matteo Piantedosi pushed back strongly at suggestions that the rescue was delayed or affected by government policy discouraging aid groups from staying at sea to rescue migrants. The EU border agency Frontex has said its aircraft spotted the boat off Crotone late Saturday and alerted Italian authorities.

Italy sent out two patrol vessels, but they had to turn back because of the poor weather. The rescue operation then went out early Sunday after the boat had splintered.

"There was no delay," Piantedosi said. "Everything possible was done in absolute prohibitive sea conditions."

'Motorist killed in West Bank was US citizen'

Jerusalem: Israeli authorities said on Tuesday that a motorist shot to death by a suspected Palestinian gunman in the occupied West Bank held both American and Israeli citizenship. It was the latest in a bloody string of violent attacks roiling the region.

The government identified the slain man as Elan Ganeles, 27, of West Hartford, Conn. A friend told local media he had been visiting Israel for a wedding and driving on a highway near the Dead Sea when he was shot. The attackers remained at large on Tuesday.

Ganeles was the sole fatality of what the army said was a multi-site shooting spree a day earlier. The army said the attackers opened fire at an Israeli car near the Palestinian city of Jericho, hitting Ganeles. The assailants, travelling in one vehicle, then drove further and fired again, the army said. The attackers set their own vehicle afire and fled, setting off a manhunt.

Ganeles died later at Hadassah Medical Centre, the hospital said. He is to be buried on Wednesday in the Israeli central city of Raanana. Israeli President Isaac Herzog extended condolences to Ganeles's family.
