## Imperishable music

Among the few pearls of being a professional bullshitter — normally a pleasurable and even profitable vocation — are the presents that one receives after a talk has been delivered. These gifts tend to be heavy and useless — for example, the name and logo of the host institution inscribed on a metallic plate with a wooden cast, aesthetically pleasing, such as a bouquet of flowers, although if the talk was in some place other than Bengaluru, the flowers would wither long before one reaches home.

In three decades (and counting) of public posting, altogether the nicest "return home" present I received was from the Institute of Education at my alma mater, the University of Delhi. The year was c. 2000. I forget what the talk was about (such amnesia comes with the territory), but I clearly remember what came from the host after it ended: This was an eight-volume CD set of the music of Kumar Gandharva. He was accompanied by his wife, Vasundhara Komkali. It was held (as I recall) in the FICCI Auditorium near Mandi House and the duo sang for all to hear, bhajans composed by Kumarji as well as folk melodies he had adapted for the concert stage. It was absolutely magical. Though I sat in one of the last rows, the sublime sweetness of the music reached me well enough.

The CDs that Anita Rampal

gifted me had some of the bhajans Kumar Gandharva sang that day, and much more. There were some superb, short renditions of jod ragas that he had composed. There were longer khayals, ragas such as the lyrical Hameer and the grand Shankara. And there were bandishes uniquely linked to him, such as "Rajan ab to ajaa re", the Raga Nand.

This was an eight-volume CD

set of the music of Kumar Gandharva. The gift was chosen by the Institute's director, Professor Anita Rampal, who must have remembered that when she and I were students in the 1970s, it was sometimes seen at classical music concerts in the company of her boyfriend (later husband), the physicist, Vinod Raina.
