THE SPEAKING TREE

Always Hope

UN Messenger of Peace JANE GOODALL, DBE, tells NARAYANI GANESH that we can overcome challenges, so long as we keep alive the flame of hope

You got the Templeton Prize 2021 for 'scientific and spiritual curiosity'. Have you helped bridge the gap between science and religion?

Jane Goodall: My mother never saw any conflict between science and religion — nor did my mentor, Louis Leakey; neither do I. I wanted to be a naturalist. It was Leakey who told me I needed a PhD in order to be taken seriously by other scientists, and at Cambridge University I learnt to think in a logical, scientific way, which I loved. But I think that empathy for one's subjects is equally important.

It is sad that the materialistic lifestyle of many has broken their spiritual relationship with the natural world. Religious fanatics have caused so many to distrust religion. Every major religion has the same golden rule: Do to others as you would have them do to you. I have tried to bridge the perceived gap between science and religion by talking about the sense I have — especially in the forest — of a great spiritual power from which I gain strength. I am delighted that many great scientific minds are now convinced that there is indeed an Intellect behind the creation of the universe and life on Earth.

Human intellect, Nature's resilience, youth power and the indomitable human spirit — you say these are reasons to not lose hope. But haven't we used human intellect to destroy our inner and outer worlds?

Indeed, we have destroyed much, because of greed, ignorance, and lack of education. Only when head

and heart work in harmony will we attain our true human potential. Some of the best scientific brains have come up with innovative technologies like solar power that enable us to live in greater harmony with nature. As more people become educated about environmental problems, we are thinking of ways to reduce our ecological footprint each day.

Are you saying that there's no breaking point in the natural world?

No, nature is not infinitely resilient and in some places, ecosystems have collapsed as a result of unsustainable use of finite natural resources. We are approaching a tipping point that will lead to a downward trajectory, a point of no return. That is why we must take action now.

How to give young people hope in their own power to change things?

The main message of the Jane Goodall Institute's Roots & Shoots (R&S) programme for young people is that every one of us makes some impact on the planet every day, and we can choose what sort of impact we make. If we were just one person making ethical choices, it would make no difference. But there are now hundreds of thousands of people all making ethical choices. That is making a difference. Companies are beginning to produce items more sustainably and ethically — usually in response to consumer pressure. When someone loses hope, the best remedy is to take action, to work to solve some problem that they care about.

SCIENCE & SPIRIT

Often they can do something about a specific problem, especially if they form a group. Together they can clean a small stream so that clean water runs into a river. When many such groups all do this, the river itself will gradually become clean. When you take action, you make a difference; you are inspired to do more. And you will inspire others to join. Our R&S groups are in over 60 countries — growing rapidly across India.

Is what we call the indomitable human spirit, a religious-spiritual dimension, biological instinct for survival? Or does it have a religious-spiritual dimension?

Yes, part of the indomitable spirit is the Will to Live which we share with other animals. But I mean people who set out to do the seemingly impossible and refuse to give up, even losing their lives sometimes. Mahatma Gandhi standing up to British colonialism in India, Nelson Mandela in South Africa. And I am thinking of people with devastating physical disabilities that cause some to give up, understandably, but there are those who refuse to see themselves as victims and inspire thousands.

NIA raids 15 I&K sites in terror cases, nabs ultra

Ops Tied To IED Recovery, LeM Chief's Arrest

Jammu/Srinagar: The National Investigation Agency (NIA) on Saturday conducted raids at 15 locations across Jammu & Kashmir and arrested a terror associate in connection with the recovery of a size-improvised explosive device (IED) from two terrorists at Junjungan on June 27, and the February 6 arrest of Hidayatullah Malik, the chief of Lashkar-e-Mustaafa — an offshoot of terrorist group Jaish-e-Mohammed — on the outskirts of Jammu.

In the Jammu region, the NIA raids are being carried out in Samba, Kathua, Ramban and Banihal (Ramban district) and

at Shopian and Anantnag in the Kashmir region. A terror associate Irfan Ahmed Dar from Anantnag's Batingoo was arrested on Saturday. Preliminary investigation revealed that he was involved in carrying out terror activities in collaboration with other arrested accused. NIA said.

2 Pak intruders killed along IB in Punjab

Chandigarh: Two Pakistani intruders were shot dead by the Border Security Force along the International Border in Punjab's Tarn Taran district, an official of the BSF said on Saturday. The BSF troops noticed suspicious movement near the border fence at 8.46 pm on Friday, he said. The BSF personnel asked the intruders to stop, but they did not pay heed to warnings. Sensing threat, the BSF troops opened fire, the official said, cri-

Scribe's body was mutilated in Taliban custody, say officials

New Delhi: The body of Danish Siddiqui, a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist who was killed in Afghanistan last month, was badly mutilated while in the custody of the Taliban, officials said on Saturday.

The revelation comes amid concern that the fighting in Afghanistan has become increasingly brutal as peace talks have stalled. Siddiqui, 38, was killed when Afghan commandos he had accompanied to Spin Boldak were ambushed. Initial photographs from the scene showed his body with multiple wounds but fully intact.

But when the body was transferred to a hospital in Kandahar, it had been badly mutilated, according to two Indian two Afghan health officials there. They reviewed multiple photographs that showed Siddiqui's body had been mutilated. An official said the body had nearly a dozen bullet wounds. **NT**

Sources said India made it clear that the 'sequential process' of disengagement, de-induction and de-casualisation was critical to the 15-month troop confrontation, which was triggered by the People's Liberation Army (PLA) making multiple intrusions across the Line of Actual Control in early-May last year.

"Gogra, Hot Springs and Depsang were all raised by the Indian delegation, which also included additional secretary (East Asia) Nagesh Srivastava from the external affairs ministry. India will pull back troops if an agreement is achieved on all three hotspots with the first two. The bottom-line for India remains

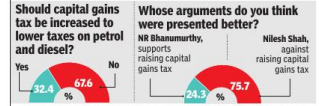
