# Kamakhya Devi replica in Navi Mum

Assam CM Himanta Biswa Sarma announced the development during a meeting with a media delegation from Maharashtra, that was visiting Assam to learn about various ongoing projects

Navi Mumbai is set to receive a replica of the Kamakhya Devi Temple located in Guwahati, which was the epicentre of a famous political rebellion in Maharashtra. Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma announced the development during a meeting with a delegation of journalists from Maharashtra, who were visiting Assam to learn about various ongoing projects.

The chief minister stated that he had already discussed the idea of establishing a Kamakhya Temple in Navi Mumbai with the counterpart Eknath Shinde and had written a letter requesting a suitable plot for the temple's construction. He said due to his busy schedule, he hadn't yet been able to personally inspect the plot but expressed his intention to do so soon in order to finalise the location.

He praised Shinde's enthusiasm for the project, noting that Shinde had a deep faith in the Kamakhya Devi temple and had visited it after becoming the chief minister.

The connection between Maharashtra and Assam goes beyond the temple project. Sarma recalled that during the political rebellion in Ma-

harashtra, there was widespread discussion of a dialogue that portrayed the natural beauty of Assam. Even after the success of the political upheaval, leaders of the Shiv Sena Shinde faction visited the famous Kamakhya Devi Temple to seek blessings and held discussions with Sarma. These discussions covered various topics, including the

construction of the temple. The Kamakhya Devi Temple is a place of worship for millions of devotees from across India, including Maharashtra.

Sarma revealed that the play Jaanata Raja, which tells the heroic tale of Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj, will be performed in every district of Assam. This play

draws inspiration from Shivaji Maharaj's legacy, as the people of Assam, similarly, did not allow the Mughal Shahi to establish a foothold in their region.

Due to the significant number of citizens from Assam living in Maharashtra for their livelihood, there is a deep connection between the two states. Likewise, Marathi

people reside in Assam, and the Maharashtra Board in Assam has requested the construction of a Maharashtra Bhavan in Guwahati.

He mentioned that chief ministers of both states have agreed to this request, signifying the strengthening of cultural ties and political harmony between the two regions.

Discussions between the chief ministers of the two states covered various topics, including the construction of the temple

# Legacy of Pt CR Vyas echoes in centenary year celebrations

Wednesday will be marked by vocal concert by his grandson; his sons will also pay a tribute to him in separate concerts

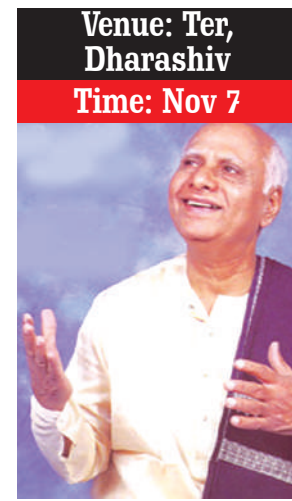

The family and disciples of Pandit CR Vyas, the legendary Hindustani classical singer, will gather at Ter in Dharashiv district today (Tuesday) to launch the year-round celebrations of his centenary year with Abhang gayan by Shri Ganesh Kumar at Trivikram temple.

Pandit Vyas was born as Chintamani Raghunath Vyas at Ter, a small village in Marathwada on November 9, 1924, to a family of kirtankars. Inclined towards music at an early age, Chintamani started accompanying his father to kirtans. His mother wanted him to pursue higher studies to be a government servant, but he wanted to become an Indian classical singer and devote his life to music.

He came to Mumbai in search of an ideal guru, and was lucky to find two - Rajaram Paradkar and Jagannath Purohit. After his initial training with Paradkarbuva, CR Vyas started learning from Jagannathbuva. The reason for his shift was very simple - he wanted to learn the emotional nuances of singing. In Mumbai, he lived for many years in Chembur and a street there is named after him.

Pandit Vyas composed many new bandishes with the

pseudonym Gunijaan. He also created many new ragas. His ragas and bandishes are still sung by the younger generation of classical singers. He was one of the first teachers at the Bharatiya Vidya Bhavan, Chowpatty, and Val-

labh Sangit Vidyalaya, Sion.

Despite wanting to devote his life entirely to music, worldly duties prevented him from doing so 24x7. He worked at the Imperial Tobacco Company (today's Indian Tobacco Company) for many years to keep his home fires burning. During his tenure there, he was responsible for one of the first sponsored Indian classical singing concerts and the first sponsored drama festival - the Berkeley Drama Festival. It was during a discussion with CR Vyas that the then CMD of ITC got the idea of starting a music academy as an activity under corporate social responsibility.

Pandit CR Vyas defied all logic when he sang for four hours at a stretch within three months of his severe brain stroke. Doctors had predicted he would not be able to sing for at least six months. It was sheer grit and passion for music that helped him achieve this feat.

In the celebrations at Marathwada, the second day (Wednesday) will be marked by a vocal concert by CR Vyas' grandson, along with other disciples. Vyas' son, santoor maestro Satish Vyas, will also be paying tribute to his father on santoor. The celebrations will end on November 9 with a vocal concert by Vyas' eldest son, Suhas Vyas.

# Activist challenges 10-acre plot for temple in Navi Mumbai's CRZ Zone

An environmental activist has filed a petition with the National Green Tribunal (NGT) challenging the allocation of a 10-acre plot for the construction of a Tirupati Venkateswara Swamy temple in a Coastal Regulation Zone (CRZ) at Ulwe in Navi Mumbai.

City and Industrial Development Corporation (CIDCO) had initially set up a temporary casting yard in a 19-hectare CRZ1 and 2 area, including 16 hectare of mangroves, which was supposed to be restored after the completion of the Mumbai Trans Harbour Link (MTHL) project. However, CIDCO now seeks to convert this temporary landfill into a permanent reclamation.

B N Kumar, the director of NatConnect Foundation, who filed the application with the

NGT, argues that the area was originally designated as an eco-sensitive zone, and the construction of a temple in this location could have adverse environmental consequences.

NatConnect Foundation presented Google Earth maps from 2018, taken before the casting yard was built in September 2019, which clearly showed mangroves, intertidal

wetlands, and mudflats in the area. Furthermore, local communities used this region for fishing.

Advocate Ronita Bhatnagar confirmed that the application has been submitted to the NGT.

The Mumbai Metropolitan Regional Development Au-

thority (MMRDA) in its 'Rapid Environment Impact Assessment' report to the Maharashtra Coastal Zone Management Authority (MCZMA) explicitly stated that the casting yards at Ulwe (Nhava end of MTHL) and Sewree were meant to be temporary.

Kumar emphasised that he is not against the temple project itself but believes it could be constructed in a more en-

vironmentally suitable area, rather than the current CRZ location. He also commended the Tirumala Tirupati Devasthanams (TTD) for their environmental awareness initiatives and the ban on plastics.

The Institute of Remote Sensing (IRS) at Anna Uni-

versity, Chennai, commissioned by the TTD, reported that out of the 10-acre temple plot, 2,748.18 sq mt fall under CRZ1A, 25,656.58 sq mt in CRZ2, and 11,595 sq mt outside CRZ.

NatConnect Foundation noted that the CRZ clearance was given with the condition that CIDCO and TTD could use the CRZ2 part, subject to the finalization of the Coastal Zone Management Plan (CZMP) for Raigad district.

However, Kumar contended that the concession for development in CRZ2, as described in the CRZ notification, should not apply in this case, as it typically applies to areas that are already substantially built up and have infrastructure. He argued that the construction of the temple in this area could result in the destruction of a biodiversity zone.

# Two held for securing loan with fake docu

The Kalachowki police have registered an FIR against two persons for securing a home loan of Rs43 lakh from State Bank of India with fake documents. The complainant is Dhriti Das, 49, a manager at SBI's Chinchpokli branch. As per Das, a man named Anirudha Halankar approached the bank and sought a loan of Rs43 lakh for a flat in Siddhi Vinayak Complex. Halankar told the bank that he is involved in the printing and garment business. The bank examined his papers and approved the loan. Halankar had separately taken Rs1.85 lakh from another bank. He paid the instalments from January-March 2021 and was declared a defaulter as he didn't pay the dues later. The bank also found out that papers he provided were also fake.

# BMC TOUGH ON ILLEGALS



The BMC's K West ward in Andheri on Monday demolished 45 illegal structures near the Jogeshwari-Vikhroli Link Road (JVLR), which were coming in between the Metro 6 construction work. According to the civic body, the demolition will help resolve traffic congestion near JVLR and will ease travel from Andheri SV Road to the Lokhandwala area. The Oshiwara police assisted the BMC officials in the demolition. Around 50 police personnel, 25 BMC employees, two JCBs and one poclaim machine were used for the process.
