Prez Murmu to grace Council centenary

FPJ News Service MUMBAI The President of India, Draupadi Murmu, will grace the centenary celebrations of the Maharashtra Legislative Council on Monday, July 29. The event will mark the publication of the book titled 'The Necessity and Significance of Senior Assembly Halls' at the Vidhan Bhavan's Central Hall. Scheduled from 3.30pm to 5pm, the ceremony will also honour elected members from both the Legislative Assembly and Council with awards for 'Outstanding Parliamentarian' and 'Best Speech', presented by the President. Key dignitaries expected to attend include Governor Ramesh Bais, Chief Minister Eknath Shinde, Deputy Chief Ministers Devendra Fadnis and Ajit Pawar. Also present will be parliamentary affairs minister Chandrakant Patil, and deputy speaker of the Assembly, Narhari Zirwal. The book to be released will feature discussions on pivotal legislative bills, resolutions, and principles approved by the Council, as well as critical deliberations on various topics over the years. The event will also honour the work of senior journalists appointed to the editorial board. The editorial committee includes journalists such as Vilas Mukadam, Yogesh Trivedi, Dinesh Gune, Sanjay Jog, Uday Tanpathak, Kishor Apte, and Sheetal Karadkar.

Rain washes city but can't wash filthy tap water

FPJ News Service MUMBAI Even as Mumbai is consistently recording a good amount of rainfall, the problem of contaminated water has been plaguing several housing societies for the past two months. Citizens have complained of dirty water in taps which cannot be rectified with any amount of boiling. The major complaints received are from wards T, K-West, H-East and R-Central where the problem began prior to the monsoon but worsened in the last one month. For Mulund West in particular, this is the third consecutive year that the problem has surfaced. Rupal Bhoir, a resident of Tirumala Heights on Balrajeshwar Road, said, "The water is so contaminated that when we use alum to collect dirt from it, it makes layers and layers of it. Last week the situation got better than the previous three weeks but the impurity has increased yet again. I have senior citizens and infants in my family and we are continuously worried

about water-borne diseases." In Kalanagar, Bandra East, the problem started two months ago and was reported by the FPJ on May 20. The residents said that although the situation is better than May, the supply is still yellowish in colour. Residents continue to consume boiled water to save themselves from vomiting and diarrhoea. Well-to-do localities like Juhu are also facing similar problems. Various parts of Juhu Vile Parle Development (JVPD) scheme received muddy water for over a month. Though the issue has been resolved, Juhu Koliwada and nearby slums are still suffering. Juhu resident Sunil Kanaujia, a resident of Juhu, said, "Previously the issue pertained to the entire Juhu, but the BMC changed a lot of faulty valves and pipes after which we have not received any muddy water. However, Koliwada is still suffering as a lot of pipelines pass through sewers." The problem has also spread to Gorai village and the Villagers Welfare Association said that it began with a pipeline that broke during road repairs. Switsy Henriques, the association's president said, "The problem started on June 27 with a leakage in a valve. Whenever it rains, we receive muddy water. The BMC has said that they have fixed the issue but there has been no electricity for the last 24 hours to turn on the pumping motor and check the quality of water."



STEADY RISE | Stock enough to last 7 months

Tansa is 2nd lake to overflow, total stock now at 58%



FPJ News Service MUMBAI The Tansa lake in Thane district overflowed on Wednesday following heavy rainfall. It reached its maximum capacity at 4.16pm, following which three of its gates were opened and 3,315 cusecs of water was released. This lake alone contributes 455 million litres of water to Mumbai's daily supply. Tulsi, the smallest of the seven lakes, began overflowing earlier on July 20. On July 1, the total stock in the lakes was just 5.91%. Within three weeks, it has surged to 58.58%, which is projected to be adequate for the next seven months. On June 5, the dwindling stock compelled the BMC to impose a 10% water cut. The situation worsened as the stock continued to drop to a

significant low of 5%. However, following heavy rainfall in recent days, the scenario has since seen a dramatic turnaround. In the 24-hour period from Tuesday 6am to Wednesday 6am, significant rainfall was recorded at various lakes. Upper Vaitarna received 115mm, Modak Sagar 87mm, Tansa 65mm, Middle Vaitarna 100mm, Bhatsa 67mm, Vekar 67mm, and Tulsi 64mm. In the past five days alone, the total stock has surged by 2.48 lakh million litres. Currently, it stands at 8.41 lakh million litres. In 2023, it was 7.64 lakh million litres and 12.76 lakh million litres in 2022. Mumbai requires 14.47 lakh million litres by October 1, which is adequate to meet its needs till the next monsoon.



Fire in highrise, 14 people rescued within 30 minutes

Shefali Parab-Pandit MUMBAI Fourteen residents were safely rescued following a fire that erupted in the electric duct of a high-rise building on SV Road in Jogeshwari West on Wednesday. Four people, including a senior citizen, were admitted to a private hospital after they complained of suffocation. Although the blaze was swiftly brought under control, the malfunctioning fire-fighting system of the building posed challenges during the operation, according to a fire official. A probe will be conducted and a notice will be issued to the building accordingly, stated the official. The incident occurred at EE Heights, a ground-plus-20-storey building near Delhi Darbar hotel on SV Road in Jogeshwari West. The fire was confined to the electric wiring and cables in the electric duct from the 15th to the 20th floors. Two fire brigade engines, two jumbo tankers, an ambulance, and other equipment were rushed to the spot. A fire official said that residents were in a state of panic and hesitated to evacuate their flats. He added, "As the fire was contained within the electric duct and had not spread to any of the flats, we were able to bring it under control within half an hour. We learned that two residents had already been taken to a private hospital before our arrival at the spot. We rescued six women, four men, and four children from these floors, guiding them safely down the staircase." Minaj Memon (41 years), Imran Memon (40 years), Iqbal Chunarwala (71 years), and Nazima Chauhan (47 years) were admitted to a private hospital after experiencing suffocation. While Chunarwala was discharged after treatment, the other three are under observation. "A senior fire official said, "The building was not operational during the rescue. So a notice will be sent for deficiencies under the Maharashtra Fire Prevention and Life Safety Measures Act"

Frigate ship fire: Body of missing sailor found

FPJ News Service MUMBAI Nearly 48 hours after INS Brahmaputra caught fire, the body of the sailor who went missing in the accident was fished out on Wednesday. The Indian Navy leading seaman Sitendra Singh had gone missing after the blaze that erupted when the frigate ship was docked for refit at Naval Dockyard on Sunday night. The Indian Navy said in a statement that Singh's mortal remains were found after intensive diving operations. The Chief of Naval Staff (CNS) Admiral Dinesh K Tripathi had visited the Dockyard on Tuesday.



Deep trouble for sub-engrs with 48-hr pothole fix diktat

Shefali Parab-Pandit MUMBAI The Brihanmumbai Municipal Engineers Union (BMEU) has strongly objected to the notices sent by civic authorities to sub-engineers regarding delays in pothole filling. They have urged civic commissioner Bhushan Gagrani to organise a meeting with sub-engineers to address the technical challenges faced on ground. The union has also criticised agencies like Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority (MMRDA) and the Public Works Department (PWD), accusing them of neglecting road maintenance while carrying out their projects. The city is witnessing a sig-



nificant surge in potholes due to heavy downpour. The BMC has directed its 227 sub-engineers responsible for pothole maintenance to address complaints within 48 hours. The authorities have also started issuing show-cause notices for delays in repairs. Sainath Rajadhyaksh, BMEU's executive president, highlighted these issues in a letter to Gagrani, underscoring the practical difficulties faced by the road department. Rajadhyaksh said, "Despite

NOCs given for metro work, roads are not being adequately maintained by their contractors. Civic engineers are now fixing potholes not only on metro-affected roads but also on those managed by PWD, MMRDA, and Maharashtra State Road Development Corporation (MSRDC)." He added that contractors are failing to supply necessary materials and labourers to repair potholes. Rajadhyaksh has requested to appoint engineers in two shift for every beat as the existing 227 sub-engineers are working 18 hours a day, including weekends, to complete their tasks. Additional municipal commissioner (projects) Abhijit Bangar was not available for comments.

'People more religion-sensitive than before'

Urvi Mahajani MUMBAI We are staying in a democratic secular country, where everybody should respect the religion and caste of another; and people should refrain from any knee-jerk reaction, the Bombay High Court's Nagpur bench has said. The court further said that nowadays people have become more sensitive about their religion than before. The court quashed an August 2017 FIR against two men who were booked under

section 295A of the Indian Penal Code (deliberate and malicious acts intended to outrage feelings of any class by insulting its religion or religious belief) for allegedly posting offensive messages on a WhatsApp group. They were also booked under the charges of intentional insult to breach public order and criminal intimidation. The FIR was registered by one Shahbaz Siddiqui against Pramod Shendre (army soldier) and Subhash Waghe (medical practitioner) for allegedly sending offensive

messages against the Muslim community. Siddiqui, who was also a member of the group, alleged that the duo were raising certain questions about Prophet Mohammad and also sent messages saying those Muslims who refuse to say 'Vande Mataram' should go to Pakistan. A bench of Justices Vibha Kankanwadi and Vrushali Joshi said that the police should be able to prove that the alleged insult made by the accused was done with a deliberate and malicious intention of outraging the

religious feelings. It noted that since the chats were end-to-end encrypted, the messages sent in the group could not have been seen by any third person who was not a member of the group. The judges noted that the WA group comprised 150-200 persons from both Hindu and Muslim communities and they discussed political issues. "We can foresee that when the political issues are discussed, then it will definitely give heated exchange of thoughts and there will be fire-works," the judges remarked.

Burial niches at Juhu cemetery vandalised

Manoj Ramakrishnan MUMBAI Shocking images of vandalised burial niches at Juhu Koliwada cemetery, with human remains strewn on the ground, have distressed the local residents. The niches, part of a columbarium, is attached to the Holy Cross Church in Juhu Koliwada. The cemetery land, however, is owned by the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC). Clara D'Souza, a resident of the area, said that her mother's burial niche was among those vandalised. "This vandalism has been happening for some time. It happened again two days ago and a friend who had visited the cemetery told me about it," said D'Souza. Juhu's senior police inspector said that they have not received any complaint but they will visit the cemetery to make an inquiry. However, residents said they have complained earlier about incidents of vandalism. "People have kept quiet about it as they feel there is no point in complaining," added D'Souza. The cemetery has no permanent graves, except for one, as there is no space for new burials. Buried remains are usually exhumed after a few years and transferred to a niche so that the ground can



be reused. The cemetery does not have security though it has a caretaker. The church's parish committee is expected to take up the issue at its next meeting in August. Father Angelino Vaz, the parish priest of Holy Cross Church, said that the vandals enter the burial ground from the disused Hindu crematorium next door. "There are no lights and there have been robberies in the past," said Vaz. Meanwhile, community group Watchdog Foundation has written to the state administration and the police about indignity against the dead. "The area is frequented by many anti-social elements, particularly drug addicts. We demand immediate intervention of the police and arrest of culprits," said Godfrey Pimenta of Watchdog Foundation.
